## Democrat's Letter Compliments Flemming

Representative Edward N. Fadeley, Lane County Democrat, complimented University President Arthur S. Flemming, a Republican, and took a swipe at State Senator Walter J. Pearson, a Democrat, in a letter sent to Flemming Tuesday.

Fadeley wrote the letter in the wake of Pearson's criticism of Flemming's Lincoln Day Dinner speech, in which the University President reaffirmed his intention to work actively in politics.

"**LAST SUMMER** I wrote you personally welcoming your progressive influence upon the State and upon your party," Fadeley said in the letter. "Now I want to say publicly that I still welcome that influence and that both the State and your party can use it."

Contacted by telephone Tuesday, Fadeley said that many people think of Flemming only as the University President. The state representative said he believes that Flemming generally speaks publicly for himself in political matters, not as an academic administrator.

**FADELEY SAID** that it would be a mistake if people who have

the experience and knowledge of Flemming should act as if they have no convictions.

"Since Senator Pearson is nominally of my party, you may be thinking that my party can use a little progressive influence too," Fadeley said in his letter. "But let me say that in my personal judgment his thinking is as far from that of the rank and file Democrat as is the thinking of the more conservative members of your party."
