Investigation Ordered
WASHINGTON (UPI)—Attorney General Robert Kennedy has ordered a Grand Jury investigation of whether the steel price increases are in violation of the anti-trust laws.

A Justice Department spokesman said Thursday the Grand Jury will be convened in New York City.

Kennedy also announced in Washington that the government is studying whether U.S. Steel "so dominates the industry that it controls prices and should be broken up." U.S. Steel, America's largest steel producer, was the first of the companies to announce the six dollars a ton increase.

Earlier, an attorney for U.S. Steel said the corporation had been served with a subpoena.

Pledges to Work

Sigma Chi President Ken Wilson has announced that eight members of the fraternity's pledge class will be working on the grounds of the Pearl Buck school this Saturday morning. Wilson stated that this work is part of the pledges' initiation and will continue to be so.

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Israeli Journalist Speaking Monday

Shabtai Teveth, one of Israel's most popular journalists and writers will speak at the University at 7:30 p.m. Monday in room 101 of the SU.

His lecture is entitled, "Israel, The Middle East and the New Countries."

Teveth is on a three-month lecture tour of the United States under the joint sponsorship of the United Jewish appeal and the E'nai B'rith Hillel Foundations.

He has been a member of the editorial staff of Haaretz, Israel's largest independent morning daily, since 1950, most frequently writing series of articles on his country's social-political problems. His assignments involved him in some of the most serious issues facing Israel today, such as immigration, absorption, education, youth, medical service, business and industry, and the relations between Israel and the Jews of the world.

In 1954 he served as roving correspondent, making a tour of 12 European countries. He was sent twice to North Africa in 1955, and was assigned to Paris during 1959-60.

Teveth has published two collections of short stories, a book on the Sinai campaign and one on the 50th Anniversary of Tel Aviv. Another book, titled "For Israelis Only," is scheduled for early publication. A radio play of his was chosen as Israel's entry at the 1959 Prix Italia world competition.

Born in 1925 at a farm settlement near the Israel-Jordan border, Teveth studied at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem and first visited the U.S. in 1946 to specialize in journalism. He began his newspaper career with the Gazette and Daily in York, Penn., then with the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin. He also studied sociology and economics at Temple University. In 1948 he interrupted his studies to return to Israel to serve in the armed forces. He served as deputy editor of the Israel Defense Forces' weekly publication. He is married and the father of two children.

Goldberg to Assist Peace Corps Picks

Lewis R. Goldberg, assistant professor in psychology at the University, will leave for Washington, D.C., early next month to assist in the selection and assessment of Peace Corps members.

He will assist E. Lowell Kelly, director of selection of corps members. Selection occurs after corps applicants have received training at one of the several training installations in the United States and Puerto Rico. Goldberg said he will act as Kelly's representative at various installations.

Goldberg believes the selection project will tie in well with his special interest in psychology, personality assignment.

Kelly was Goldberg's doctoral thesis adviser at the University of Michigan. Goldberg will probably remain with the Peace Corps staff throughout the summer.
