

Library Contest Prizes Total \$570

A total of \$570 in cash and book awards will be given winners of a Library Day Prize Contest at the University.

Students will submit their personal libraries in one of 22 categories for competition. Libraries will be judged on the selection of titles rather than on total number or monetary value. According to judging criteria, the library should indicate a future collection, balanced and broadly selected, which will be worthy of a

place in the library of a well-educated person.

DEADLINE for entering the contest is 5 p.m. today. All students, undergraduate and graduate, at the University are eligible. Entries are limited to 50 titles for each category. Each book must bear a definite mark of ownership. Paper back books may be included, and students may enter more than one library in various categories. A list of rules may be obtained at the University Library.

Main categories and their sponsors are: Undergraduate Student's General Library, University Co-operative Book Store; Undergraduate Student's Specialized Library and Graduate Student's Specialized, The Association of Patrons and Friends of the University Library.

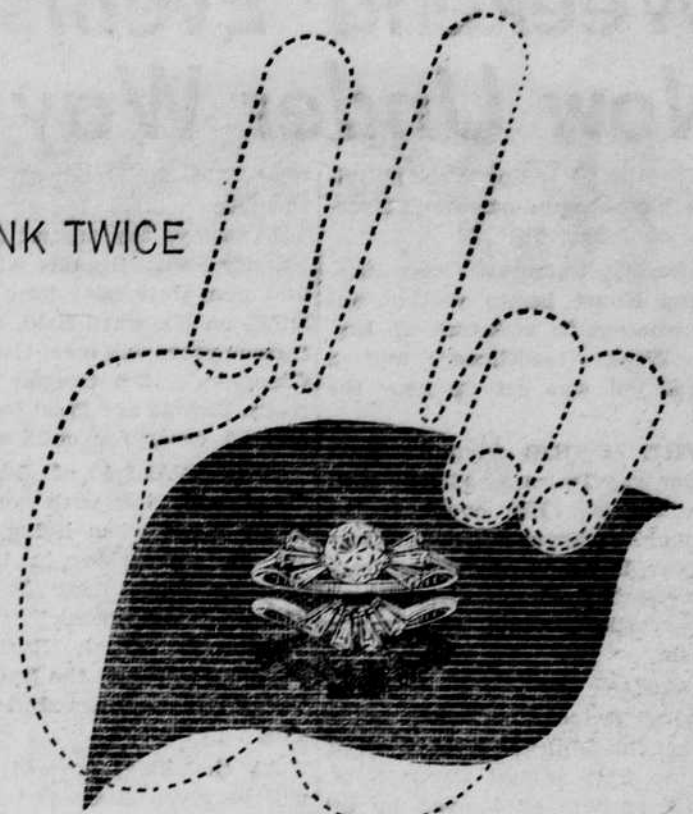

Many Events To Mark 'Library Day'

The 26th annual Library Day will be celebrated Saturday at the University Library.

Special displays throughout the library, the announcement of winners in the Student Library contest, and a tea honoring the contestants will comprise the day's program.

Displays of the libraries entered in competition will be in the Reserve Book Room and Newspaper Reading Room. They may be seen from 12 noon to 4 p.m. University time (1 to 5 p.m. DST) Saturday and from 1 to 4 p.m. University time (2 to 5 p.m. DST) Sunday.

In the Circulation Lobby an exhibit entitled "Out of the File Cabinet to You" will feature examples of the wealth of pictures and pamphlets available for loan.

And in a special case in the lobby the "Portugaliae Monumenta Cartographica," an Atlas issued by the government of Portugal honoring Henry the Navigator, will be shown.

At 3 p.m. University time (4 p.m. DST) Saturday, contest prizes will be awarded in the Newspaper Reading Room. Announcement will also be made of the winners of the Peter Pauper Press Essay Contest, and the local award for the Amy Essay Contest. Following the award ceremony, the tea will be held in the Circulation Lobby. At 7 p.m. University time (8 p.m. DST) that evening the Josephine Evans Harpham Silver Award will be made at the All-Campus Sing at McArthur Court.

Activities at the library are sponsored by the Association of Patrons and Friends of the University Library.

Two Remington Standard typewriters have disappeared from the Oregon office, room 307, SU. The machines were removed sometime between the afternoons of May 2 and 3.

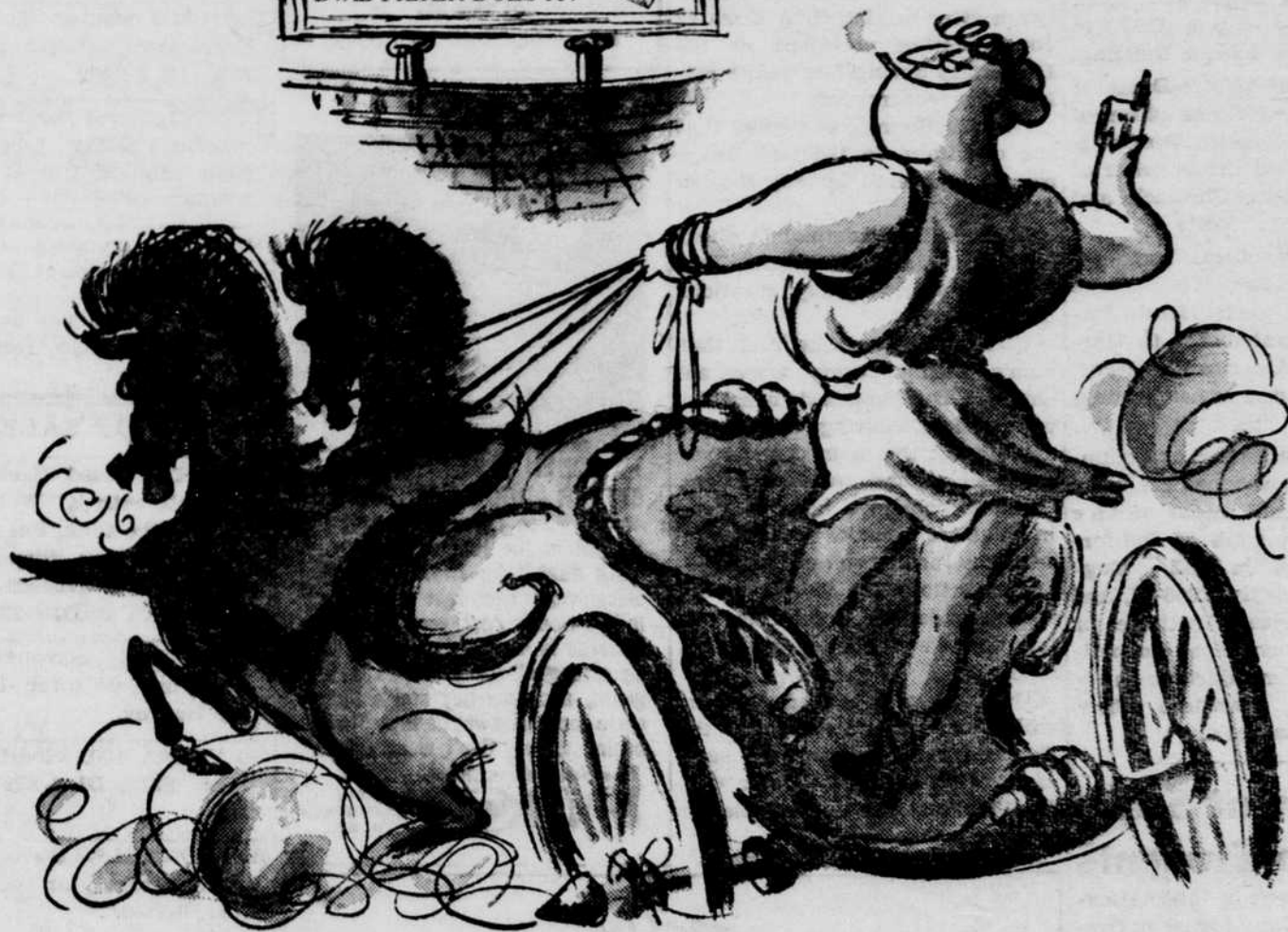
