larger issue of tickets to dormitory residents, and a reduced rate to fraternity and sorority members.

MONEY MADE by student activities on campus is credited to the group's trust fund, which is administered by the SU office, Cross explained, stating that the profit from this year's Junior Weekend would make up a \$1200 deficit suffered on last year's Sophomore Swing.

Each class has a trust fund established for it in its freshman year, and it can draw upon this money by means of requisitions issued through the SU office. Money earned by the activities is credited to the trust fund account, Cross said. At the end of the classes' senior year, the class can decide upon the disposition of any profits. This is usually used for commencement activities, occasionally as gifts to the University.

THE JUNIOR Class will receive the proceeds from the Sing which will also absorb the losses from the Luncheon and Prom.

Profits from the Canoe Fete will go into a special Canoe Fete Fund, Cross said, and will be used for the next year's Fete.

Browsing Room Lecture

Economics Professor Will Discuss Role of Alliance for Progress

Has the "Alliance for Progress" been a failure? An authority on Latin America, Raymond F. Mikesell, W. E. Miner, Professor of Economics at the University, will discuss this question at the final Browsing Room Lecture of the current school year Wednesday night.

Discussion leader for the 6:30 p.m. (PST) lecture in Student Union will be Robert L. Allen, associate professor of economics.

MIKESELL HAS had extensive experience with Latin American countries. He has been a consultant to the Pan American Union from 1954 to date; member of a working group on the Latin American Common Market (U.N. Economic Commission for Latin America), 1958; project director of study on Latin American economic development, undertaken for Senate Foreign Relations Committee, 1950-59.

He is of the University overseas research and training program in cooperation with Latin American Institutions.

Mikesell also served as a consultant for the Berle Latin American Task Force, state department during April 1961, as consultant, department of state 1961-62; consultant, Joint Economic Committee of the Congress of the United States, 1961-62; and consultant, Senate Foreign Relations Committee, 1962.

FINDINGS MADE by Mikesell on a trip to South America from February through April of this year will be the basis of much of his talk. He visited the continent on a lecture grant from the Department of State's Cultural and Educational Exchange program.

The economics professor visit-

ed Colombia, Chile, Argentina, Brazil, Ecuador, Puerto Rico, and stopped briefly in Panama, Peru and Mexico.

Much of the time he received joint research and graduate student exchange programs which the University has established with the University of the Andes in Bogota and with the University of Chile in Santiago. He also prepared a report for the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on his trip.

MIKESELL HAS written numerous articles published in scholarly journals, monographs, and many books, including "Foreign Investments in Latin America," 1955, and "Economic Policies Toward Less Developed Countries" (with Robert L. Allen), 1961.
