

German Study Year Offered to Musicians

A year of music study in Germany is being planned as part of the University's 1963-64 curriculum.

The program, announced this week by Robert D. Clark, Dean of Faculties, is sponsored by the University in cooperation with the International Society for Music Education.

FINANCING of the program will be solely through fees charged to the students, with no cost borne by the State System of Higher Education.

Cost of the year in Germany will be \$1980, plus the regular University tuition fee. Included in the total charge is transportation from New York and return, housing and meals in German homes. Bus transportation to enable students to visit Switzerland, Austria, the Netherlands and France, and attendance fees at operas, concerts and music festivals.

Edmund Cykler, music professor, has been named director of the program.

THE PROGRAM, as Cykler outlines it, will not be a tour but a part of a student's educational experience. The curriculum will include 45 hours of credit in graduate and undergraduate courses, in music, music education, German language and history.

Students will also attend special lectures and conferences with

music educators and critics and visit radio and television stations which engage in music education programs, in addition to touring several European music centers.

Participation in the German program will be limited to 30 senior and graduate students.

Flemming Asks Land Switch Delay

President Arthur Flemming has requested that action on a proposed land exchange involving the North Bank Park be postponed for three months while an architectural committee conducts a study on the possible uses of the land.

Originally, the University planned to build a football stadium on its 100 acres of the 531 acre park by the Willamette River. The committee is now considering the possibility of building low-cost housing, a warehouse or classrooms under a stadium. No decision has been reached yet, however.

If the football stadium is built, a land exchange would be necessary to have the stadium placed in the most advantageous position in the park.

Hall has been director of the University's Summer Academy of Contemporary Arts, for several summer sessions. He has been responsible for bringing to the campus many distinguished writers.
