

Hatfield Studies Freeman Case

Governor Mark Hatfield is still studying the case of 21-year old Jeannace Freeman, scheduled to die in the gas chamber January 29, according to Hatfield's press secretary, Travis Cross.

However, Cross said, "the governor has advised the attorneys for Jeannace Freeman that he finds nothing in the case at this time as a result of their presentation which warrants the exercise of the extraordinary relief of executive clemency."

"This statement applies only to their presentation. The governor is continuing to read the transcript of her case and other documents before announcing a final decision."

Miss Freeman was convicted of first degree murder along with Mrs. Gertrude Nunez Jackson for the murder of Mrs. Jackson's two children. Mrs. Jackson pleaded guilty and received a life sentence. Miss Freeman pleaded innocent and received the death penalty.

Bids to Open For Frat House

Construction bids for the new Phi Delta Theta fraternity house will be opened January 24, with the building expected to be completed by next summer.

Eugene architects Hamlin & Martin estimated the cost at \$180,000. It will be erected on the site of the fraternity's former house at 1472 Kincaid St., which was badly damaged by fire last year. It will house about 60 students.

The new house is of contemporary style, and will include two major areas—a dormitory and an activity section. The two main portions of the split level structure will be connected by an enclosed bridge which will serve as a walkway, and include house-mother quarters, and a study room.

Benedictine Monk To Speak On Ecumenical Council

"The Ecumenical Council and Christian Unity" will be the topic of the Rev. Placid Jordan, a Benedictine monk who has been reporting activities of the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council for the National Catholic Welfare Conference News Service, at an 8 p.m. assembly in the SU Ballroom Thursday.

Father Jordan is often called the dean of American foreign correspondents, and is the master of six languages. The Newman Catholic Student Center is sponsoring his appearance.

He was credited with being first to report the beginning of World War II, and received the National Headliner's Award for announcing the end of World War II.

As religion editor and European editor for NBC, he became the first representative of the free world to broadcast a program from within the Soviet Union. Father Jordan had interest in the scope of Nazi war against Christian churches and had many contacts in the German underground movement.

All traveling expenses have already been budgeted.
