The University of Oregon wrestling team, fresh off a 15-13 victory over the Central Washington Wildcats last Saturday, travels to Washington for a pair of matches this weekend against Washington and Western Washington.

The Duck grapplers meet Washington Friday evening, then invade Western Washington Saturday afternoon.

The key performers for the Webfoots are 177-pound Bob Keeney, Doug Muck at 157, Charlie Warren at 147, Dave White at 130 and 137-pound Monrad Bjorge. Each of the quintet recorded decisions against Central Washington.

Keeney, White and Bjorge each won their respective weight classes at the University of Washington Invitational Tournament earlier in the season.

The Webfoots' freshman squad

opens its season Friday night immediately following the Oregon-Idaho basketball game in McArthur Court when it meets Clark Junior College.

Vandals Due for Weekend Series at McArthur Court

The Vandals from Moscow will invade the Oregon campus this weekend. No, not the Russian kind—the Idaho kind.

Coach Joe Cipriano's Idaho Vandal basketball team will be in town Friday and Saturday nights to lay their eight-won, two-loss record on the line against the Ducks.

Led by 6-6 junior Gus Johnson and 6-4 senior Chuck White, Idaho will be throwing a potent offense at Oregon.

In ten games thus far the Vandals have scored an average of 71.2 points.

Steve Belko's Ducks, fresh from a 62-54 triumph over Portland, will counter with a well-balanced unit led by junior forward-guard Steve Jones and senior center Glen Moore.

JOHNSON SEEMS to have been the mainstay of the Idaho team so far this season. With big Gus in the lineup, the Vandals have run up a record of seven wins and no losses.

Unfortunately for Idaho, however, Johnson has been the center of some controversy. After leaving a four-year college due to scholastic deficiencies, Johnson enrolled in a junior college. From there, he went to Idaho. The NCAA, however, declared him ineligible under existing transfer rules. He was therefore banned from competition in all NCAA-sanctioned events.

Idaho answered that they would let him play, anyway. Johnson therefore plays in all regular season games, but in no tournaments.

Playing without him in the recent Far West Classic, Idaho dropped two out of three games. The only game they won was a one-point squeaker over Washington State, a team they had bombed by forty points in an earlier contest with Johnson in the lineup.

WHITE HAS been the Vandal's leading scorer for the last two years. He will be joined at forward

ward in the starting lineup by 6-5 junior Tom Whitfield. In the back court for the Vandals will be seniors Rich Porter (6-3, and a deft scorer) and Lyle Parks (6-1).

Oregon has been plagued by injuries and cold shooting as of late. Out of the lineup in recent games have been both Moore and junior forward Jerry Anderson.

Word is out that both boys will be ready to go this weekend, though. Moore gave indication of return to form by tossing in 21 points against Portland Tuesday night.

OTHER STARTERS will probably be Jones and sophomore Eliot Gleason at guards, and 6-5 junior Jim Johnson at the other forward. Johnson has looked sharp in recent games, trying to take up some of the load left by the injured starters.

On the prospects of his team improving their 4-5 record, coach Belko says, "We've got a tough one on our hands this weekend, but if we can avoid those cold spells which have plagued us all season, I think it will be a terrific series."

The sparkplug for the Frosh in their earlier victories over Clark and Lower Columbia Junior College has been 6-3 guard Jim Barnett. Barnett, averaging 27 points a game, teams with 6-0 Rick Potter in handling most of the squad's backcourt chores.

Both Potter and Barnett were named to the All-CIF team as California preppers.

Kirsch will more than likely round out his lineup with a pair of 6-5 forwards, John Franz and Bill Jennings and 6-8 center Gene Brockmeyer.

Skeets O'Connell's Clark squad is paced by Howard Nagle and Tom Owens, who dumped in 16 and 13 points respectively the last time they appeared at Mac Court.



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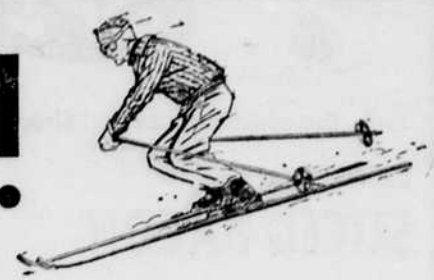
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
