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fictions are transformed. Because of this, inanimate objects take on human characteristics," he said.

Third, chronological order departs from clock and calendar time. Fictional time is exploited beyond the flashback method to montage effects to time suspension.

"Fourth, actions and landscapes are visionary and general so that the tone becomes abstract," he continued. Thus the impression of life and reality is surrealistic.

Finally, diction is heightened for poetic effect.

Hall said that since 1955 the extreme short story classification has sub-divided.

"This second kind of new story is related to the new French novel school and to such plays as 'The Rhinoceros,' he said.

"The group denies the positive aspects of the first type of extreme story," stated Hall.

The form is merely a journey, often to nowhere; the structure contains no unities of place, character, or action. In fact, like motifs are considered artificial. Diction is merely ritual and commonplace; no classic notion of man is presented.

Thus the background of this division is essentially existential, he said.

Business School To Hold Meeting

Business developments in 1963 is the general topic for a one-day conference planned by the University School of Business Administration, in Portland on January 23. The conference will take up as a special topic the several aspects of business ethics.

Featured speaker for the conference luncheon will be Dr. Roy L. Reiersen, senior vice-president and chief economist for Bankers Trust Co. of New York. He will speak on "Expectations for 1963 and Beyond."

Watson, assistant director of the University's Bureau of Business Research, Draper Daniels, national export coordinator for the U. S. Department of Commerce, and William J. Research experts from the School of Business Administration, as well as educators, industrialists, national administrators in the fields of business and taxation, and leading businessmen will participate in the panel and discussions to be held at the Benson Hotel.
