

Concert Features Komitas String Group

A Russian group, the Komitas String Quartet will appear in concert at 8 p.m. tonight in the Music Auditorium.

On their first tour of the United States, the quartet is sponsored by the Student Union Board "Little Concert Series."

Admission to the concert is by season ticket or by individual admission. Prices for individual admissions are \$2.50 for adults and \$2.00 for students. Tickets are on sale at the main desk in the SU or at the door.

THE QUARTET will perform Beethoven's Quartet in C Major, Opus 59, No. 9; Shostakovich's Quartet in D minor, Opus 83, No. 4; and Ravel's Quartet in F major.

The Komitas String Quartet was organized at the University of Moscow in 1922 and became known as Gosquartet, meaning the State Quartet of Armenian SSR. The name was changed to Komitas Quartet in 1935 for a distinguished Armenian composer and founder of the Armenian classical music.

Members of the quartet are Avet Gabrielian, first violin; Rafael Davidial, second violin; Genrih Talaian, viola, and Sergey Aslamazian, cello.

In 1938 the Quartet won the first prize in Moscow in the All-Union Competition of String

Quartets. The ensemble has performed in Russia, Czechoslovakia, East Germany, England, Austria, Iceland, and Norway.
