

Man and His Neighbor Discussed by Panel

The role of man in giving spiritual, moral, and materialistic help to his neighbor was discussed Wednesday in a religious forum concerned with "A Man and His Neighbor."

Panel members who participated in this part of Religious Forum Week were Mrs. Bessie Campbell, public relations director of Bon Marche Russell; Judge Edward Leavy, judge of Lane County circuit court; Dr. J. Edwin Orr, lecturer and author of history; Ernest Unger, who is connected with the Eugene Mission; and the moderator, Dr. W. Scott Nobles, associate professor of speech at the University.

When asked to define the term "neighbor," Judge Leavy stated that it is "philosophical, not practical, to recognize everyone as a neighbor" and that "some type

of bond or need must exist before a man can be considered a neighbor." Although the panel generally agreed that everyone is a potential neighbor, Orr added that "humanity is my neighbor" and that everyone has needs although sometimes not apparent ones.

Nobles suggested that "individuals have forfeited their responsibility to institutions (such as) churches, governments, the Red Cross, boy scouts, etc."

Mrs. Campbell said that people escape their responsibility because they feel unqualified to participate in these large groups but are not aware that they can help individually.

To meet spiritual as well as material needs, Orr said that man can be evangelistic, can share the "good news" without unwisely imposing his dogmas on other people.

Unger defended aid to seemingly unworthy people by stating that "it is hard to divide or determine those who are capable of being helped from those who are helpless."

Nobles in turn defended U.S. armament by saying that "we are not trying to destroy others but trying to prevent them from making a mistake that would harm both them and us."

The panel concluded the session with the idea that a selfish motive can be recognized in all giving, but there is "nothing degrading" when this motive is for self-satisfaction or personal happiness in doing things for others.

Culture Topic of Cressman Speech

Luther Cressman, Ph.D., founder of the University's anthropology department, will make an address on the history of anthropology study at the University, at 7:30 p.m., Thursday, in the Dad's Room of the SU.

Cressman, who will retire at the end of the year, will speak of the cultural continuity of the subject of anthropology, in order to acquaint students with the department.

Before coming to the University in 1929, Cressman taught at the College of the City in New York, Columbia University, and Washington State Normal College.

His written works include "Archaeological Research of Northern Great Basins", published in 1942, "Klamath Prehistory", 1956, "Cultural Sequences at The Dalles, Oregon", 1960, and "The Sandal in the Cave (Indians of Oregon)".

Cressman is the director of the University's Museum of Natural History.

Tuberculosis Office Offers Free X-Rays

The Eugene Tuberculosis Office, located at 25 W. 8th St., has announced its hours for x-rays and examinations.

The office will be open on Thursday and Friday afternoons from 1-5, from 10 to 12 a.m. every third Saturday of the month, and from 7 to 9 p.m. every last Friday of the month.

Teachers are reminded that they should have their x-rays and examinations at least two weeks before the beginning of the school term.

These examinations are a Christmas seal project, supported through the sale of Christmas seals. They are at present free to all residents of Lane County.

Math Dept. Wins Grant for Summer

The University has received a \$65,300 grant from the National Science Foundation for an eight-week institute for high school math teachers.

The session, from June 17 to August 9, will allow 50 teachers from throughout the state to participate. Stipends of not over \$75 per week will be awarded.

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Committees Set To Select Deans

The School of Music and the School of Liberal Arts have appointed committees to interview applicants for the vacancies of Dean of Music and head of the Department of Economics.

These positions were left vacant by the deaths of Dean Theodore Kratt and C. Ward Macy respectively in November of last year.

James R. Hladky, associate professor of music, was appointed as secretary to the committee to select Dean Kratt's successor from the candidates. The committee is composed of various members of the Music department, including Everett S. Anderson, associate professor of music, and George G. Boughton, associate professor of violin.

Since Dean Kratt's death, Max Risinger, assistant Dean of the School of Music, has been acting head of the School.

Since Macy's death, Dr. Robert Campbell, associate professor of economics, has been acting head of the Department of Economics.

Donald H. Tilson, Northwest Operations manager for Alcoa, will speak at a management lecture series at the University's School of Business Administration at 2 p.m. Friday, January 18 in 238 Commonwealth.
