

Friday Deadline Set For Preview Sign-Up

Registration will end Friday for participants in the University "Duck Preview" for high school seniors. The one day event is planned for Jan. 26. Parents have been invited to participate in the program for the first time.

The seniors will be given the opportunity to attend sessions in the department or school of their first and second preference during the afternoon. At this time, course offerings, degree programs, and professional opportunities in the various fields will be outlined by faculty members.

Special tours will take the visitors to the science building, School of Music, School of Architecture and Allied Arts, library, University Theatre, Museum of Art, ROTC department, Erb Memorial Student Union, freshman dormitories and the Honors College.

The Office of Student Affairs will have an information center with representatives of the Admissions Office, Scholarship Committee, Dormitory Office, Dean of Women's Office, Dean of Men's Office, Co-Operative Housing, Panhellenic and Inter-Fraternity Councils available. The University Counseling Center also will

be represented.

Members of the IFC President's Council and Heads of Houses will be present to answer questions about university life.

Tour guides will be delegates from campus honoraries or graduate students. Skull and Dagger and Kwama, sophomore men's and women's honoraries, and Phi Theta Upsilon, junior women's honorary, are assisting the staff of Greater Oregon Committee in arranging the day-long event.

Bill Hutchison is chairman of Greater Oregon. Marsha McMeen of Bend, is in charge of programming for the Duck Preview.

Duck Preview is an annual event in which high school seniors are afforded the opportunity to visit the University campus. However, this is the first year in which activities are limited to one day, with no overnight housing provided.

Russian Violinist To Give Lecture

A violinist who studied in the Soviet Union will discuss "Contemporary Russian String Techniques", at the 12th annual Conference on Music Education, sponsored by the University School of Music, Thursday through Saturday.

He is Richard Ferrin, professor of violin at the University of Washington, and one of six guest lecturers who will participate in the conference.

A noted musician, Ferrin was the first American to receive the Sibelius Award granted by the Finlandia Foundation in 1957. He has performed as soloist with the Finnish State Radio Symphony, the Eastman-Rochester Symphony and the Houston, Texas Symphony.

Presently, he is a member of the University of Washington String Quartet, and directs the Opera Orchestra.

Other guest lecturers will be William Billingsley, professor of brass instruments at the University of Idaho; Fred Hemke, instructor of saxophone at Northwestern University; Irwin Hoffman, conductor of the Vancouver, B.C., Symphony Orchestra; Ann Kern, elementary music specialist; and Lynn Sjolund, choral director at Medford High School.

Clinics and lectures, reading sessions, concerts and exhibits have been planned for the conference. Sessions will be held in the Erb Memorial Student Union and in the School of Music.

Walsh commented that responsibilities of the two boards do not overlap and they each have different aims.

"The State Board of Higher Education is essentially a policy-determining body, directly charged with management of the several institutions.

"The State Board of Education, on the other hand, has supervisory responsibilities for the community colleges and the public schools."

University President Arthur S. Flemming declined comment on the governor's proposal.

"I am waiting to discuss this with institutional executives when we meet Sunday night."

There also was discussion concerning the placing of a magazine rack in Taylor Lounge of the SU. "I'm not too optimistic right now about having anything anywhere because we've had a terrible rash of thievery. But we can't act like we don't trust anyone," said Donald DuShane, dean of men. Teasdale Speaks For Membership in NSA

The ASUO Senate is not stimulating student interest in significant issues as would be possible through University affiliation with the National Student Association, according to Young Democrats President Jim Teasdale who spoke Wednesday at the Free Speech Platform.

"The Senate is missing a dynamic element of leadership in failing to develop potential student interest in matters of state, national and world significance—due in large part to the burdensome details consuming much of Senate's productive time," he told the gathering.

Teasdale cited civil rights, migratory workers, the proposed Oregon constitution revision and the Peace Corps as "areas of significance and potential, awaiting only an adequate leadership to organize, represent and perpetuate this interest."

"Through NSA membership," said Teasdale, "the student body can send up to six delegates to a national conference—for contact with representatives of over 200 member schools."

Upon return, he noted, the delegates would form a council acting in an advisory capacity to "significant-interest groups" and would stimulate interest in "undeveloped" areas through organized Senate appearances and publicity efforts.

Teasdale noted that ASUO President Neil Goldschmidt attended an NSA conference last summer and is enthusiastic about its possibilities.

"Some Senators purport to favor stimulating interest in these significant issues, but as a whole the Senate has failed to introduce a respectable proportion of legislation in these neglected areas," he commented.

Teasdale suggested that "the Senate could well be neglecting 'significant' legislation for fear of unfavorable student response."

He feels, however, that the student body would accept such action.

Teasdale stresses that membership in NSA could encourage interest in student body elections.

"Past experience has indicated that where a controversial issue plays a role in student representative elections the students express their interest through larger turnouts at the polls." He cited as an example the stadium issue in last spring's ASUO election.

"Since the NSA council would by its function bring controversial issues closer to both student body and Senate, it is highly probable that these issues would promote greater interest in ASUO elections," Teasdale suggested.

Young Democrats passed a resolution Tuesday favoring membership in NSA and are currently circulating a referendum petition to place the matter on the ballot spring term if the Senate fails to approve NSA membership.
