

Lane Senator Moves To End Death Penalty

Oregon's youngest state senator, Edward N. Fadeley, D-Lane, Thursday introduced two bills which may abolish capital punishment in the state.

Fadeley, 33, told the Emerald in an exclusive interview that his action is based upon his belief that "capital punishment is wrong."

The bills he introduced will, if successful, eliminate all mention of capital punishment from the state constitution, and make changes in the Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) providing life terms for those convicted of first degree murder.

Discussing his philosophy regarding the death penalty, Fadeley said "legalized murder doesn't seem to me to benefit society either morally or in an attempt to prevent illegal murder."

"A life is taken either way," he said.

Fadeley, a Eugene attorney, said, "As a lawyer, I appreciate the fact that a mistake can be made, and when capital punishment is used there is no recalling the mistake."

One of the bills Fadeley introduced in Salem late Thursday afternoon will provide for repeal of Sections 37 and 38 of Article I of the state constitution. Fadeley said the bill differs from one introduced by Sen. Don Willner, D-Portland, which also would abolish capital punishment, in that his bill will eliminate all mention of the penalty from the constitution. Sections 37 and 38 provide for the death penalty for first degree murder.

The other bill will change the ORS dealing with penalties for first and second degree murder. The bill changes the death penalty to life imprisonment and changes the penalty for second degree murder from life imprisonment to "not more than 25 years."

First degree murder is defined in the statutes as killing another person in the commission or attempt to commit rape, arson, robbery or burglary, or the killing of any peace officer when the officer is acting in the line of duty, or any killing done "purposely, and of deliberate and premeditated malice."

Second degree murder is described as killing another without premeditation, in the commission or attempt to commit any other felony, in a duel, or a killing done by a person "evincing a depraved mind."

Hemke To Solo At Conference

Fred Hemke, the only American to win a first prize in saxophone at the National Conservatory in Paris, will play a prominent role in the University's 12th Annual Conference on Music Education, which ends tomorrow.

HEMKE will be guest soloist at a concert and reading performance and Saturday afternoon. He will also conduct a saxophone clinic today.

Hemke's appearance as soloist will be with the University Symphonic Band under the direction of Robert Wagner. The program includes a performance of a "Historical Survey of Wind Band Music in the United States, 1800-1945," and is open to conference delegates only.

He is known nation-wide as a saxophone recitalist—only the third ever to give a recital at Town Hall in New York. His recording, "Contest Music for Saxophone," has become an educational aid for band directors as well as musicians.

THE ANNUAL conference, sponsored by the University School of Music, formally opens today with registration.

A concert by University faculty members today at 8 p.m. in the School of Music auditorium, and the "Festival of Strings," a joint production of the Eugene and Springfield schools at 4 p.m., Saturday in McArthur Court, are open to the public.

SU Forum Series To Start Tuesday

A new open forum series modeled after the early New England town hall meetings will be inaugurated Tuesday by the Student Union Forum Committee.

THE HIGHER education budget proposals facing the state legislature will be discussed. Two University students will represent opposite viewpoints on the controversy of budgetary cuts that Gov. Mark O. Hatfield has proposed.

ASUO Senator Phil Sherburne, chairman of the Committee on Higher Education and spokesman for the state-wide student lobby effort, and Fred Van Natta, Falk fellow in political science will participate.

MIKE THURSTON, chairman of the SU Forum Committee, said, "The budget topic is one which is familiar to everyone, but students have not had an opportunity to publicly express their opinions. The town hall meeting will provide such a forum."

Tickets still are being sold at the Student Union main desk for the SU Night Club scheduled from 9 to 12 p.m. Saturday.

The state constitution provides that proposed amendments must be agreed to by a majority of the 90 members elected to both the Senate and House, and if passed, referred to the people in the next general election.

Fadeley is a 1957 graduate of the University School of Law. He received a Doctor of Jurisprudence degree, was a member of the "Order of the Coif" and was named to the school honor roll. He graduated from the University of Missouri in 1951 with an A.B.

Aside from moral objections to the death penalty, Fadeley said, "the death penalty is not evenly imposed. I don't merely speak of the Freeman-Nunez case, but of the actual experiences in Oregon. Poor people are hanged or gassed or burned, persons of influence or wealth are not."

(The Freeman-Nunez case involves a sentence of death for convicted child-slayer Jeannette Freeman, and of life imprisonment for her confessed partner-in-crime and mother of the children, Mrs. Gertrude Nunez Jackson.)

In reference to the case, Fadeley said, "I am not like some people who are against capital punishment only when the person awaiting (it) is not disagreeable." He added, "I do not think it deters the type of person who would commit such a crime."

He added "I expect it would be easier to bar capital punishment when there is not any outrageous murder immediately before the public."

The bill to amend the ORS would retain the death penalty in two instances. It recommends punishment "by death or life imprisonment" for treason against the state, and for any person convicted of first degree murder while already serving a life sentence.

Fadeley said the two bills he introduced are identical to those recommended to the 1961 Legislature by the Interim Committee on Criminal Law and introduced by Rep. George Van Hoomissen, D-Multnomah, and Sen. Carl H. Francis, R-Yamhill, as a joint resolution. The bill failed to pass. Neither man is a member of 1963 Legislature.

The latest state-wide vote on the abolition of capital punishment to be permitted by the Legislature was defeated in 1958. The vote was 276,487 to 264,434.

If Fadeley's bills are successful in the legislature, the general election vote would be in 1964.

whole organization. The senator said that the control of NSA was centered in the 30-member National Executive Committee which controls election, officer certification, and budget.

The newest senator, McCall, opposed joining NSA because he said measures it passed were not effective in generating action.

Phil Sherburne, junior class president, said that student involvement in political issues and exchange of ideas on a national basis should be the basis for consideration of NSA membership.

He suggested that representatives be elected from this campus to go to an NSA session so that the student body could decide on membership based on profit from membership, not statistics read from the group's literature.

RAUL SOTO-SEELIG, a foreign student from Cuba who started circulating the NSA referendum petitions, spoke from the gallery in support of membership.

He said that the number of representatives the University would be allotted should not deter joining NSA.

"One man, not six, can do a lot. What can be done depends on that one man."

"NOT ALL foreign students are here just to study," he continued. "Some foreign students are here because of political crisis." He said that the NSA support given certain foreign policy decisions

had great effect on building friendship between the United States students and those in foreign lands.

Mary Morrissey, sorority representative, said that the student government at the University was in a transition period of philosophy. She said that membership in NSA should not be considered until campus politics had taken a more international outlook.

Because of the long USNSA debate, the Senate was forced to delay discussion on a procedures bill and an ad hoc committee to study academic potential in dormitories.
