



CONSTRUCTION of the new Humanities Building is progressing rapidly, with cement work currently underway. The building is being built on the quad between the University Library and Condon and Chapman Halls.

Classroom Bonding Plan Supported by Legislature

A plan to construct classrooms through bonding issues and to repay the bonds from student tuition has won the support of several state House and Senate leaders.

THE PLAN provides for the construction of new classroom buildings as soon as they are approved by the legislature, without a state-wide bond election. House Speaker Clarence Barton, D-Coquille said that the plan would be a "sound practice." Senate President Ben Musa, D-The Dalles, commented, "I can't see anything wrong with it if it can be done within the framework of the law."

Existing law calls for a special student building fee, the proceeds from which go into a fund for paying off dormitory, Student Union, and similar building costs.

SENATOR ALFRED H. Corbett, D-Portland, and Rep. John Mosser, R-Washington County, who proposed the classroom plan, made the joint statement, "It seems logical that if charges can sustain self-liquidating projects like dormitories, the Board could make similar allocations to cover the classroom buildings which are determined necessary to meet the unusually large increase in students."

Mosser and Corbett are exploring the possibility for amending the existing law to provide a specific allocation from tuition funds earmarked for paying off instructional buildings, laboratories, and other facilities.

IF THE Mosser-Corbett plan is adopted, changes in budget as well as the existing statutes would be necessary, but the total dollars involved would not be any more than if general bonds were issued, the proponents assert. Money would be saved because expensive state-wide elections would be unnecessary.

It is claimed by Mosser-Corbett that the present budget sets a "double standard," in which the governor has approved a request for self-liquidating student projects but has cut classroom re-

quests by half. "This means that classrooms may not be constructed, although housing facilities are available," they explain.

"It would make more sense to build classrooms and dormitories at the same rate. Perhaps classrooms could be incorporated into dormitories, constructed in such a way that a room can be used during the day as a classroom, and as a library or social room during the evening, cutting down on unused space."

Corbett said that bonding attorneys have been consulted as to the legality of the proposal.

Aliens Must File Address Reports

Foreign students on campus are reminded that Thursday, Jan. 31 is deadline for filing address report forms for aliens, according to Alfred J. Urbano, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service in Portland.

The filing of this form is required under provisions of the 1952 Immigration and Nationality Act.

The Immigration official said failure to comply can lead to a fine, jail sentence, and deportation for willful violations.

Urbano said that the law requires every alien except those having diplomatic status, representatives of certain international organizations and persons admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers to file at the nearest post office or Immigration and Naturalization Service office.
