Willamette Pass Offers Skiing Fun

When skiers in the Eugene-Springfield area decide where to go on a weekend, they most frequently elect Willamette Ski Area—the closest ski area to the metropolitan center.

Willamette Ski area is located 70 miles southeast of Eugene on all-weather Highway 58, a one hour and fifteen minute drive.

The ski area, at the top of the Cascade divide, has been plagued this season with the same problem afflicting ski areas throughout the West—lack of snow. Normal winter snows, however, blanket Willamette's broad, open slopes with five feet or more of snow.

Willamette's main slope, with an 800-foot vertical rise, is served by a Pomalift which whisks skiers to the top in a three to five minute ride. The lower half of the main slope, in addition, is served by a 1,000-foot rope tow.

Willamette has two other slopes served by three rope tows—the "Bunny" hill for beginning skiers and the Register-Guard hill for ski instruction classes.

A daily Pomalift ticket costs \$3, and a ticket for the rope tows only is \$1.75. There are special rates, however, for University of Ore-

gon groups, according to George Annis, manager of the ski area and director of the ski schools.

The day lodge at the ski area was enlarged this season by the area's new management, ten Cottage Grove school teachers, who purchased the ski area last fall. The day lodge includes a cafeteria.

The new management is planning to build a new modern lodge this summer which will include fireplaces, cafeteria, observation room, nursery and "indoor plumbing."

Other facilities at Willamette include a Ski Patrol building, a ski shop with rental ski equipment, and a ski school which teaches the latest "American" ski technique.

A full ski outfit of skis, ski poles and boots—all new this season—may be rented for \$3.50 a day or \$1.75 for half a day. The various pieces of equipment may also be rented separately—skis, \$1.50; poles 50 cents; and boots, \$1.50, for a day, or half those prices for half a day.
