Campus Chest Charity Drive Set Next Week

Campus Chest drive, only approved all-campus charity campaign, will be Monday, Jan. 28 through Monday, Feb. 4 with a goal of \$3000.

Doug Ragan is chairman, assisted by John Luvaas, promotions; Barbara Cannon, treasurer; Mike Holt, upperclass men's dorms; Mark McCulloch, fraternities; Sarah Richards, sororities; Wendell Wong, co-ops; Mike Delfson, freshman men's dorms; Sanday Ako and Kathy Lynch, upperclass women's dorms; Pam Bladine and Nancy Collins, freshman women's dorms; and Pam Pashkowski, speech team.

Funds will be contributed to Pearl Buck School and United Appeal. The staff of this year's Campus Chest recently toured four of the organizations which this year's drive will support—Pearl Buck School for mentally retarded children, Eugene Hearing and Speech Center, Salvation Army, and the Red Cross.

University money raised through Campus Chest will be channeled to 25 organizations, mainly state and local. These include youth services, family and aged help, aid for the sick and handicapped, and emergency relief, all of which depend primarily upon contributions.

To meet this year's goal, each living organization has been asked to give a percentage of the total \$3000 totaling about 75 cents per person. Leading contributors will be given daily recognition and the highest per capita contributor will receive a trophy. Flying speeches will be conducted in all living organizations this week to give additional information and answer questions.

Peck May Resign

SALEM (UPI) — Governor Mark Hatfield waited on Representative Grace Peck in the Oregon House today and won a delay in her proposed investigation of the resignation of the Director of the Oregon Primate Research Center.

The Governor made an unusual personal visit to the House chamber after the topic was brought up at his new conference this morning.

It apparently was the first the Governor had heard of Mrs. Peck's proposed probe into the resignation of Dr. Donald Pickering as the center's director. Some 100 employees at the center have protested the resignation.

The Governor waited a short while in the house until he could talk with Mrs. Peck.

Mrs. Peck said the Governor indicated he hoped to work out the dispute within a week.

She said her committee would delay any visit to the center or any hearing at least until then.

Explosion Upsets K

EAST BERLIN (UPI) — A mysterious pre-dawn explosion rocked East Berlin's government compound where Soviet Premier Khrushchev was staying for the East German Communist Party Congress. Khrushchev and East German Chief of State Walter Ulbricht later showed up smiling for the final session of the Congress. Khrushchev beamed and kissed Ulbricht when Ulbricht was reelected as Party Chief. The Communists made no reference to the explosion.

Business School Sets Public Talk

Douglas Strain will be the second speaker in a series of public lectures scheduled by the School of Business. Strain will speak at 1 p.m. today in Room 238 Commonwealth, on policy making in the electronics field.

Strain graduated from the California Institute of Technology with a BSEE in 1948. Working in the electronics field, he has been a design engineer for Beckman Instruments, Inc.; vice-president of Research and Engineering, Brown Electro-Measurements; and president of the Electro Scientific Industries.

He is currently director of the National Management Association, a member of Executive Committee of Industrial Instrument Section of the Scientific Apparatus Makers, the Oregon Council for Economic Education and many other professional groups.

the University of Oregon Dental School in Portland.

THE FRATERNITY will be used as a dormitory, and will mark the first time the Dental School has provided school-sponsored housing for students.

Dean H. J. Noyes of the Dental School justified the purchase on the basis that with more supervision and better study surroundings, the rate of attrition of students in the first two years of Dental School will be lessened.

Price To Recount Trip to Glacier

Robert Price, who led a three-man expedition to the Casement Glacier in southeast Alaska during 1962, will discuss his trip at the Browning Room Lecture at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday.

Price, assistant professor of geography, will show slides of the trip to illustrate his topic, "The Retreat of Glaciers in Glacier Bay, Alaska." The expedition was sponsored by the Institute of Polar Studies, Ohio State University, and financed by the National Science Foundation.

The geographer, who joined the University faculty in the fall of 1962, has done field work in Scotland and Ireland and was a member of the Gerner Glacier survey team in Zermatt, Switzerland, in 1959. He graduated from the University of Wales, and received advanced degrees from the University of British Columbia, Vancouver, and the University of Edinburgh, Scotland.

Price is a member of the Royal Scottish Geographical Society, the Association of American Geographers, Canadian Association of Geographers, American Geographical Society, and is a Fellow of the Royal Geographic Society of London.

Discussions leader for the lecture will be Clyde Patton, associate dean of the Graduate School and associate professor of geography.

at the earliest. The delay has been attributed to IBM trouble.

Fall term dropouts are: freshmen, 129; sophomores, 22; juniors, 13; seniors, 2; graduate and other special students, 5.

About 40 state fee, district and county scholarships have been withdrawn, according to June Webb, scholarship secretary. Mrs. Webb said this is out of a total of 406 and one or two may be renewed on the basis of a waiver.

SCHOLARSHIPS of this type are not renewed if the holder is carrying under 12 hours or fails to achieve at 2.5 GPA. Those scholarships withdrawn will be given to students on the state fee alternate list, said Mrs. Webb.

Out of 34 Joseph Kinsman Star scholarships held by students, three were withdrawn and another received a waiver despite poor grades, she said.

Foreign student adviser Howard Ramey said about 55 foreign students have lost their scholarships out of a total of 277. Ramey said this is because some foreign students have withdrawn or transferred as well as for low grades and not enough credit hours.

He added that this number may change with waivers. Foreign students are required to maintain a 2.0 GPA for their scholarships.

Flemming To Talk To Businessmen

University President Arthur S. Flemming will be a featured speaker at the Fifth Annual Business Conference in Portland Wednesday. His topic will be "Changing Ethics of the Western World."

FOLLOWING Flemming's address, a panel, under the chairmanship of former Oregon Governor Robert D. Holmes, will discuss the broad aspects of business ethics—function and relevance of ethical considerations in business decision making, the impact of behavioral sciences on ethics in decision making, and the relation of individual ethics to the problem of public policy.

Panel members will include Albury Castell, professor of philosophy at the University; Rabbi Emanuel Rose of Congregation Beth Israel, Portland; Gus J. Solomon, Chief Judge of the United States District Court, Portland; and Walter W. R. May, publisher of the Oregon Voter.

Other featured speakers will be Roy L. Refelson, senior vice president and chief economist, Bankers Trust Co., New York; and Draper Daniels, national export coordinator for the U. S. Department of Commerce, Washington, D.C.
