Physical Fitness Test Conducted

A second physical fitness test was conducted by Oregon State University and the University of Oregon. This test revealed that those who did not participate in physical education in the eleventh and twelfth grades scored considerably lower than those who did.

A similar study was held in the fall of 1961 with identical conclusions reached.

"Both universities are in agreement on the results for both men and women students," said Dr. H. Harrison Clarke, research professor of physical education at the University of Oregon.

Dr. Clarke further stated that the average of non-participant students were about at the lower one-third of those tested, and they also compared unfavorably with state and national norms.

Dr. Clarke, professional consultant to the President's Council on Physical Fitness, likewise stated that the tests would prove that the lack of physical education in Oregon public schools in the eleventh and twelfth grades is very definitely contributing to the nation's physical fitness problem.

"Further," said Dr. Clarke, "it was resulting in providing built-in handicaps for boys and girls graduating from these schools. It is inconceivable that this situation can continue to exist."

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Dubos Compares Role of Scientist Past and Present

Speaking at the first of the 1963 Condon Lectures, Rene Dubos, microbiologist and experimental pathologist associated with the Rockefeller Institute, compared the role of science in yesterday's world with its role in today's world.

Many scientists believe that the reason for science "is to understand the universe and man's place in the universe," while others would argue that science has only a "practical" side, enabling men and society to improve materially, said Dubos.

Referring to these arguments as the "intellectual conflict," Dubos told his audience that the arguments were irrelevant. He stated that there is "no difference between the practical and theoretical sciences," and remarked that "both are linked together as fruit to a tree."

DUBOS RECALLED that until the last century, "science was made up of individuals working alone." The situation has changed, he said. Today there is a "multitude" of scientists working together as teams on large projects.

It was the Industrial Revolution which produced the large number of scientists who direct their interests on particular problems, said Dubos.

"All classical biology has been concerned with the construction of the smallest things—what they are made up of," he said, reflecting on the influence of the Industrial Revolution on biology. This specific interest on the practical, "does not make it possible for the biologist to look at the entire organism," said Dubos.

"Our universities must awaken," he added. "When we wake up we will find that we must study very abstract problems."
