

Ducks Set for Huskies

Controversial Johnny Grayson will bring an improving Washington Husky basketball team to Mac Court this weekend.

Grayson, who has recently been suffering from an acute case of

bad press relations, will field a tall, well balanced team to face the Ducks.

Vastly improved since their early season, 59-57 loss to Oregon, the Huskies will be placing a record of six wins and eight losses on the line. This record includes triumphs over two highly regarded hoop squads.

Washington dumped both Colorado State and UCLA out of national rankings by scoring upset victories. The Huskies bumped UCLA twice, and are currently riding third in the AAWU with a record of three wins and three losses.

Steve Belko's Webfoots will be out to improve on a 6-7 record. Last weekend the Ducks survived an attack of frostbitten shooting hands to score a two-game sweep over Washington St.

Washington's lineup shows good size and a well-balanced scoring touch. Dale Easleys, a 6'7" boy whom the Huskies are booming for All-Coast honors, will start at center. Ed Corell, a senior as is Easley, will carry his 6'6" height to one starting forward spot, while 6'7" Steve Wilson will open at the other. Starting in the back court for the Purple and Gold will be 6'1" senior Larry Sharp and 6'3" junior Charlie Hart.

Easley is the leading Husky scorer (16.1 PPG), while Correll tops the squad in rebounds. Correll set a Washington school record by hauling down 30 rebounds in an 81-59 victory scored by the Huskies over Oregon last year.

Oregon's starting lineup, which underwent some juggling last week, will include Steve Jones and Jim Johnson at forwards, Glenn Moore at center, and Elliot Gleason at one guard. The other guard position is up for grabs, and the starter could be Johnny Mack, Pat Loy, or Bob Yates.

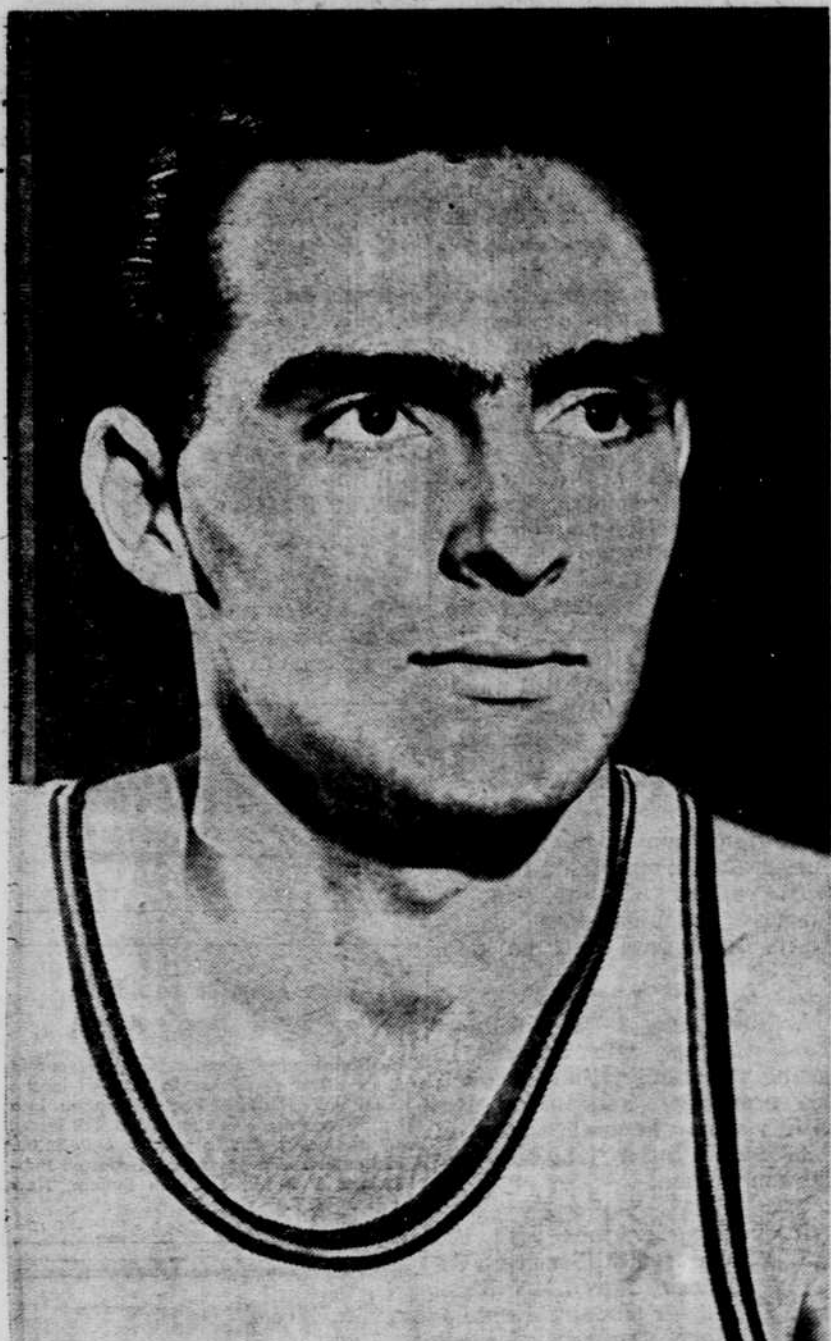
Jones, Moore, and Johnson have been the Webfoots big guns so far this year. Jones, a 6'5" junior, leads the team in scoring with a 15.7 PPG average. Johnson leads the club in rebounds with 110, but is closely followed by the 6'7" Moore with 109.

Moore is second in team scoring with 13.9 PPG, and Johnson is third with 12.5.

All in all, this game looks like a real war. The teams are very evenly matched, as witnessed by the squeaker pulled out by Oregon in Seattle last December.

Washington shot poorly in dropping two games to Stanford last weekend. Unless the Ducks' shooting percentages come up, this game might look like an Eskimo's convention. However, if Belko can get his troops into a scoring mood, the fans might get a chance to see a demonstration of the notorious temper of Husky mentor Grayson.

ED CORELL, above, is Washington leading rebounder and their second leading point producer. He will be responsible for a good part of the Huskie offensive efforts in their attempt to get revenge on the Ducks for their last second win earlier in the season.

Sub-Four Minute Milers Enter Meet

Four sub-four minute milers will highlight the Third Annual Oregon Indoor track and field meet in Portland's Memorial coliseum Saturday night.

Oregon's Keith Forman, ex-Oregon greets Dyrol Burleson and Jim Grelle and Finland's Olavi Salonen all have traveled a mile in less than four minutes.

However, none of the quartet will compete against each other in the meet. Forman will run in the two mile where he is the defending champion. Grelle will face the fine field in the 1,000 yard run. Burleson will run for the Emerald Empire Athletic Association in the two mile relay. Only Salonen will be in the mile run and he will have to be considered the favorite in that event.

Not only is Forman the defending champion in the two mile but he also was selected the outstanding performer in last year's classic and will be out to pick up that award again.

Oregon will send a 14-man team to the meet. Six of these were point winners in last spring's N C A A Championship Track Meet. Besides Forman, these include hurdler and broad jumper Mel Renfro, high jumper Terry Llewellyn, javelin thrower Les Tipton (who will enter the high hurdles), Mike Lehner in the two mile and Dave Steen in the shot put.

Renfro will compete in a broad jump field in which the top four men have all topped 25 feet, 9 inches. Renfro will have to compete with the likes of Darrell Horn and Ralph Boston. Both have cleared the 26 foot barrier.

The high mile run also should be one of the better races. Wendell Cox of Hillsboro will return to defend the title he won last year. His time of 4:24.5 is a meet record and a Coliseum record.

Sioma Kagan, professor of international business, is to receive a Certificate of Appreciation from The Council for International Progress in Management.

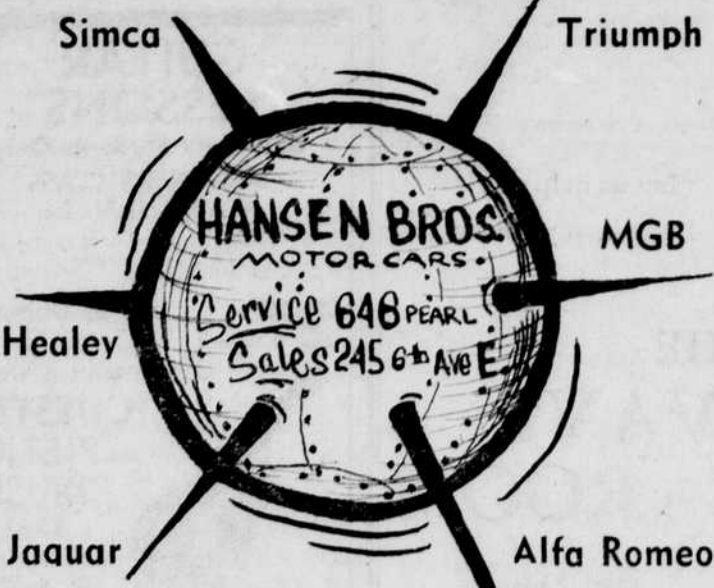
The award is to be presented in New York on Jan. 30 to Kagan, in recognition of the Management Seminars that he conducted in Buenos Aires, Argentina, last July.
