Ike Speaks Out

NEW YORK CITY (UPI) — Former President Eisenhower says his administration planned only a "guerrilla type" action in connection with the Bay of Pigs invasion in 1961. Mr. Eisenhower discussed the Cuban situation and other topics in a one-hour television (CBS) program Wednesday night.

Bad Weather On Tap

CHICAGO (UPI) — One of the worst winters in America's history continues to ravage great sections of the United States with bitter cold, heavy snow and cutting winds. Temperatures sank to new lows throughout the midwest and South Wednesday as the new Arctic blast moved in.

Cold wave warnings are in effect from the Plains to the Gulf Coast and snow and freezing temperatures are expected in the South Wednesday night. Snow and sleet covered parts of Arkansas, Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee, Virginia and North Carolina during the day and the rest of Dixie is prepared for the same today.

Tax Bill Goes Today

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy sends Congress his record 10 billion dollar tax cutting bill today, exactly one week after he submitted the biggest spending budget in history. The President has said he considers tax relief the most important legislative goal in the 1963 session.

Refugee Ship Slowed

MIAMI (UPI) — The Red Cross announced Wednesday night the departure of the cargo ship the "Shirley Lykes" from Havana, with up to 1,000 Cuban refugees, would be delayed until late today. But one plane load of 98 Cubans and Cuban-Americans has landed in Miami.

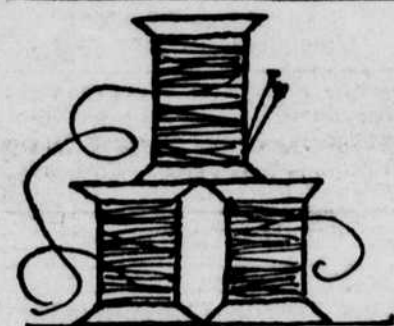
The Red Cross said Cuba is returning 250,000 vials of polio vaccine which were part of the prisoner ransom goods. The Cuban government said it had just completed an oral vaccine program and the serum was not needed.

Eleven Die in Fires

CHICAGO (UPI) — Eleven persons, 10 of them children, died Wednesday in three cold-weather fires that swept their homes in the Middle West. Five children died in a Milwaukee, Wis., fire. Three girls died in a blaze at Morris, Ill., and two girls and an adult were killed in a fire at Gary, Ind.

Nehru Accepts End

NEW DELHI (UPI) — Prime Minister Nehru said Wednesday night he has accepted the Colombo proposals for ending the Sino Indian border dispute. The Communist New China News Agency said in a broadcast, however, that Nehru's interpretation was an attempt to extend Indian control over "Chinese territory."



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Board of Higher Education Denies 'Padded Budget'

SALEM—A Joint Ways and Means subcommittee of the Oregon legislature heard Wednesday that the Board of Higher Education "hasn't come in here with a budget that's padded."

WILLIAM WALSH of Coos Bay, president of the board, told the subcommittee on education

that it was the board's job "to put the picture up to you and let you decide what you want." commodity you are dealing with is one which can't be watered down."

His remarks came as the subcommittee started to dig into the sticky problem of how much money to appropriate for higher education during the next two

years.

CHANCELLOR Roy E. Lieualen of the System of Higher Education told the lawmakers that the board is asking for \$87.2 million for operating expenses next biennium, just to keep the services at the present level under the increasing enrollment load.

That is a 29.6 per cent increase in the budget, for an enrollment increase of 35.7 per cent, Lieualen said. Gov. Mark Hatfield has asked for \$83.5 million, or a 24 per cent increase.

Sen. Alfred H. Corbett, D-Portland, and Rep. John Mosser, R-Beaverton, served notice on Lieualen that they wanted to take a close look at how much out-of-state students should be charged for tuition.

"The question is who are we providing education for," Mosser said, "and we need to consider whether to admit any out-of-state students and whether to charge them the full cost of their

education."

The total higher education budget request for the next two years is \$113.2 million — about \$3 million more than Hatfield requested.

The general fund appropriation asked by the board is \$74.8 million. The governor is asking \$63.4 million, but called for an increase in tuition to make part of the difference.

HATFIELD'S major tax programs will be before the legislature by the end of the week. The 4-cent cigarette tax bill was drafted Wednesday for introduction.

Morse Takes Action On Cuban Information

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse Wednesday ordered an immediate Senate subcommittee inquiry into reports of an intensive new Soviet military buildup in Cuba.

MORE TOLD a reporter he is asking the State Department to provide a quick briefing for the Senate Latin American Affairs Subcommittee, of which he is chairman.

The staff of the Foreign Relations Committee, of which Morse's group is a unit, was instructed to try to set up a briefing at the earliest possible time, preferably tomorrow.

MORE ACTED after the New York Times News Service reported Soviet forces in Cuba are working 24 hours a day building and improving "highly sophisticated ground and air defenses." The story said private reports

from Havana, confirmed in part by American experts, relate that large Soviet shipments of weapons and other materials are continuing to arrive in Cuba.

"I don't know anything about it," said Morse, "but I'll certainly proceed to learn all I can."

"My first step is to call the State Department for an immediate briefing to learn what our intelligence shows. I'd like to have it as early as possible, preferably tomorrow."
