EUGENE O'NEILL'S "A Touch of a Poet" is ending its run this week at University Theatre. Curtain time is 8 p.m.; tickets are \$1.25.

during the evening. They had wels about an inch in diameter all over them.

"We have disposed of the wooden paddle. We use a leather or plastic thing that's not quite as bad." The fraternity member said pledges get little sleep or food, do much work around the fraternity house and a number of physical tests.

He called the hazing "completely demoralizing and completely depriving." In regard to reports of perversion during hazing, he said, "I've heard rumors, but I can't really be sure."

THE UNIDENTIFIED fraternity man said "none of them (the pledges) like it or very few of them do ... everyone gets drunk because they can't take it any other way."

Need for common experience and tradition were cited as justification for hazing. He said no pledge in his house was dropped "because they couldn't go through it." They didn't live up to what the fraternity expected of them but they were brought in anyway.

DISCUSSING his personal feelings, he said "I'm quite undecided. I can convince myself either way. I've convinced myself that its really not necessary now. However, I do feel that there would be something lacking if we did away with it."

"I'm glad I went through it—I think it made a man out of me. If we just give them their pins, if they don't do anything to earn them, you might as well just mail the pin to a high school senior who says he wants to be in the fraternity."

DEAN OF Students Donald M. DuShane said Thursday evening he has no comment on the Eugene newspaper's story. "Dean Hawk and I met with President Flemming today. We are continuing our investigation to obtain all the facts. We are determined to make it as complete as possible."

Dean of Men Ray Hawk added that "anything said now would be premature since we are in the process of an investigation."
