

Bridges To Postpone Appearance Here

Harry Bridges will probably not speak at the University until Spring term, Jim Teasdale, Young Democrats president, said Sunday.

Bridges, controversial president of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union, has been invited to speak here by the YD organization.

TEASDALE said he talked to Bridges on the telephone Friday. The Longshoreman leader indicated that the current eastern strike and a union convention in April would prevent his appearance here until late April.

The YDs are seeking a featured speaker to appear with Bridges. "We are hopeful that a debate can be arranged," Teasdale said.

HE MENTIONED Harrison Spangler, former Rep. Edwin Durno, and Howard Morgan, Federal Power Commission official, as possible debaters. Spangler is the author of a campaign book about U. S. Sen. Wayne Morse.

Last week the University Young Republicans passed a resolution opposing the appearance of Bridges on the campus. YR Chairman Tom Hoyt said Bridges would hurt the chances of higher education appropriations in the State Legislature.

TEASDALE, in an interview Sunday, criticized the YR stand. "I think it is very paradoxical that at the same meeting when the YR's opposed Bridges because they felt it would injure the stu-

dent lobby effort, they also announced support of the governor's higher education budget, which the student lobby opposes."

The Hatfield budget, he said "is definitely unkind to public education."

The YD President called upon the Young Republicans to reconsider their opposition to a speech by Bridges. "Hoyt has alleged that Bridges is a Democrat. I have no doubt that he is a democrat, however for Mr. Hoyt's information, Bridges is a registered Republican."

"I hope they will suggest a speaker who would debate with Bridges. Perhaps they could arrange for someone the calibre of Dr. Durno or Sig Unander (former U.S. Senate candidate).

Schellman To Talk On Soviet Science

John A. Schellman, associate professor of chemistry, will speak on "A Month With Soviet Science," at the Browsing Room Lecture, Wednesday at 8 p.m. in the SU.

Schellman was chosen to participate in the UN-Russian Scientific and Cultural Exchange Program last year and spent September in Moscow, Leningrad, and Kiev, lecturing and meeting Soviet scientists.

SCHELLMAN has devised a mathematical theory, to be published in a forthcoming issue of the Journal of Chemical Physics, which may be an important step toward unraveling the complex structure of the protein molecule.

At Oregon since 1958, Schellman holds memberships in Sigma Xi and the American Chemical Society.

Francis Reithel, head of the chemistry department, will lead the discussion following the lecture.

RESHEVSKY has played five such simultaneous matches at the University and has never been defeated. He began giving simultaneous matches of this sort in Europe when he was six years old.

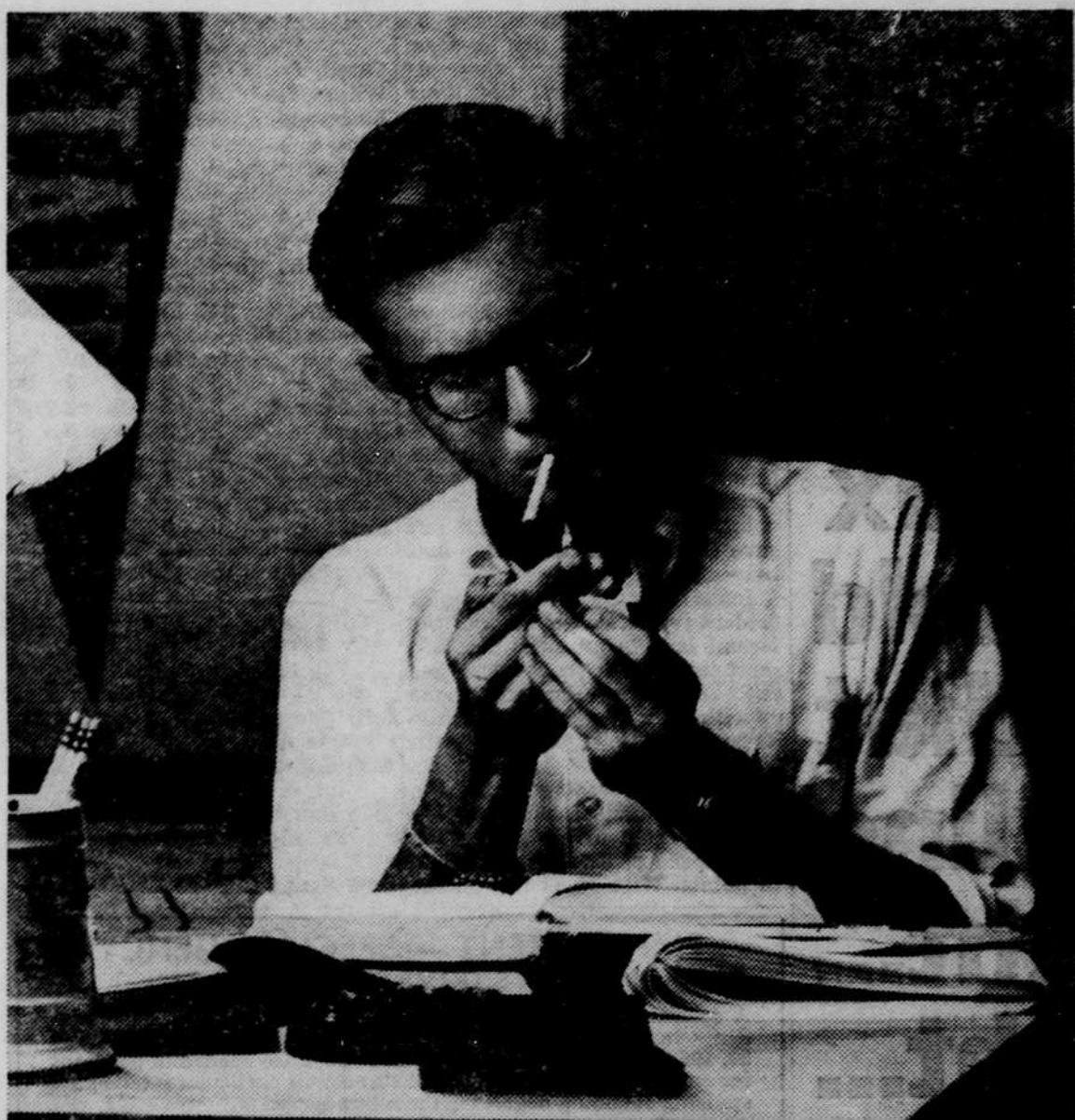
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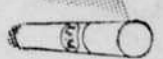


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
