

Ducks Rebound for Win In Northwest AAU Meet

The two Far West swim titans, Oregon and Washington, clashed twice over the weekend in the battle for the swimming supremacy. When the spraying had settled both teams were still resting atop the totem pole side by side.

Friday night, in Seattle, the Huskies upset Van Rossen's Webfoots 49-46 in a dual meet. The next evening Oregon came back to win the Pacific Northwest AAU Championships at the Washington pool. The Ducks scored 75 points in their nine events. Washington was second with 72 points.

There were 14 other teams, from B.C., Washington and Oregon in the meet.

The Ducks jumped off to an early lead, 17-8 after three events. From that point on they swam well, but watched their nine point lead get whittled down. Finally, Washington grabbed the lead when Ed Cazalet, a Canadian Olympic swimming representative, garnered the blue ribbon in the 200 yard backstroke.

The Oregon mermen recaptured the lead when Dale Wood and Bob Benson took first and second respectively in the 500 yard freestyle.

They held the lead as Mack Hirayama, with a great comeback effort, won the 200 yard breaststroke. Galen Kipp had taken an early lead for Washington in the event. Hirayama made his move in the latter stages of the race and overtook Kipp in the last 25 yards to register the win for the Webfoots.

The score at this time was 48-42 for Oregon. The winner of the final event, the 400 yard freestyle relay, would take the meet. The race was close most of the way, but Washington won by four seconds.

Van Rossen said, "If Arthur Thomson had been able to swim we probably would have won the race." Thomson, a junior from Australia, was found to be scholastically ineligible last Thursday afternoon.

Van Rossen felt Washington's

Ron Bowman, a Portland boy, "broke our back." He set two conference records in winning the 200 yard individual medley (2:02.1) and the 200 yard butterfly (2:03.0). The Oregon swimmers in these events, Dick Boyd and Corby Coutts, swam their best times ever, but could only finish second to Bowman.

The top scorers for Oregon were Bob Benson, eight points on a first and a second; Mack Hirayama, 6½ points on an individual first and a relay first; Dick Boyd, six points on two seconds; and Dale Wood, six points on a first and a third.

On Saturday evening Oregon and Washington completely outclassed the other teams in the AAU championships. The closest team to them was Washington's frosh, who scored 34 points.

Like all Washington-Oregon swim meets the competition was very keen, and neither team could build up a strong lead. The two squads exchanged the lead five times and were tied once during the meet.

Going into the last event the score was 53-54, Oregon's favor. This time the Ducks won the last relay to capture the trophy.

"Coming back after the first loss to win the AAU Championships took a lot of courage," said Van Rossen. "I think the boys did very well."

Van Rossen was pleased with the weekend's showing. He feels that his boys will be ready for Washington in March when the Ducks return to Seattle for the Far West Championships.

The Webfoot's next meet is Wednesday night in Corvallis.

Yang Sets World Mark With Vault of 16'3¼"

C. K. Yang, a native of Formosa competing for UCLA, set a new world's record in the pole vault with a leap of 16-3¼ last Saturday night at the Oregon Invitational Indoor Track and Field Meet in Portland.

The 8905 spectators that jammed the Memorial Coliseum gave Yang a standing ovation after his record vault and several tremendous hands throughout the evening.

For his efforts, Yang was presented with the Outstanding Athlete award at the conclusion of the meet.

Yang's world mark stole the show from the University of Oregon's own Dave Steen. Steen, the Canadian shot putter, became one of the few men in history to put the shot over 60 feet.

Steen's put of 61 feet 5½" gave him an upset victory over favored Parry O'Brien, the perennial indoor track shot put champion.

Steen's effort was his fourth over 60 feet at the meet. He had previously broken the barrier on a practice put, another official toss and once on a foul.

Another outstanding performance came from Jim Dupree in the 1,000 yard run. Dupree, representing Southern Illinois, stood off a bid by Oregon graduate Jim Grelle, to win going away in 2:15.2.

Other Oregon winners included Archie San Romani with a 4:10.5 mile, Keith Forman who ran a 9:06.6 two-mile, and the Oregon Frosh in both the mile and two-

mile relays.

Favored Dave Archibald, a California sophomore, took the 500 yard dash, as expected, with a 1:00.6 clocking.

In the high jump, Joe Faust, competing unattached, set new meet and coliseum records with a leap of 6'11". Terry Llewellyn of Oregon tied for third in the event at 6'8".

Dennis Johnson, formerly of San Jose and now competing for the Santa Clara Valley Youth Village, won the 60-yard dash over a fine field with a 6.2 timing.
