Horsehidors Begin Practice

Oregon's varsity baseball team has its first workout for the whole squad due Saturday in the field house as the Webfoots start in to assemble a squad to replace last year's 29-9 team.

The Ducks have only two of their top seven hitters back from last spring in first-baseman Sandy Nosler and centerfielder Cal Dean.

The others left via the graduation route. The pitching staff also suffered heavily.

Coach Don Kirsch has had the pitchers and catchers warming up already for the spring sport, and looks to Arba Ager and Thatch McLeod for strength in the twirling duties this spring.

Ager compiled a 3-1 won-loss mark and a 3.33 earned run average while McLeod posted a 2-0 record with a 5.40 ERA.

The Ducks lost .326 hitter Dave Moore at second base, the second leading hitter last spring, and shortstop Leon Hayes with a .308 mark.

Also missing are Trev Swangard, Ray Haroldson and Jim Cloutier, also among the top seven in batting last season.

Pitchers Jon Swanson, Bob Christiansen and Dick Brede are also gone. Swanson posted a 5-0 record and had an earned run average of 1.26 while Christiansen was the winningest hurler with an 8-3 mark. His earned run average was 1.71.

The Webfoots open their season March 18 at University of California's Edward's Field, then proceed to play five more games in five days in the Bay Area.

Pair Eliminated In Judo Tourney

Two members of the Oregon Judo Club, Bob Commons and Jim Sindberg, journeyed to Tacoma, Washington, Sunday where they competed in a judo tournament at McChord Air Force Base.

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Oregon Skiers Take Portland's Giant Slalom

Oregon's highly talented ski team captured its third victory in as many tries this season in the Intercollegiate Giant Slalom sponsored by University of Portland at Government Camp's Multotorpor Mountain Sunday.

The Webfoots men's team edged Portland State, 19-17, while Lewis and Clark, University of Portland and Clark Junior College followed in the team standings.

Carla Lawson paced the Oregon women with a first in a time of 51.4 as the Webfoots picked up 12 team points to defeat Lewis and Clark and University of Port-

land. Portland State's Joe Warr coped all honors with a time of 30.6, edging Oregon's Skip Sloan by four-tenths of a second in the men's 12-gate course.

Following in the next three places were Webfoot skiers John Seaman, Dennis Reese and Clark Gruening.

Kathy Clark, of Lewis and Clark, finished behind Miss Lawson with a time of 51.6 for the 9-gate course, while Sharon Williams and Cindy Howerton took third and fourth places for the Duck women. Stevie Bauer grabbed the eighth spot.

Cal's Golden Bears To Take On Ducks

California's Golden Bears go into action following their semester finals minus coach Rene Herrerias in a two-game set against the Webfoots this weekend at Harmon Gymnasium in Berkeley.

Herrerias had emergency surgery Saturday with the removal of his gall bladder, and is not expected to rejoin the Bears until sometime in March.
