One of the fascinating aspects of track and field is the tendency of a track crowd to take one of the athletes to heart during a meet. It usually turns out that the whole group will pick the same athlete as their favorite and practically cheer him on to bigger and better things.

Dyrol Burleson is generally in this position with Eugene fans. Whenever he takes off on his patented stretch kick, the fans immediately succumb to some kind of hysteria and cheer him on to victory.

The same thing happened at the Indoor Meet in Portland, only this time it was C. K. Yang who the fans supported. He received wild applause when he was first introduced and every time he successfully made a vault the crowd practically went wild. After his record effort he received a long standing ovation and after he made his three futile attempts at 16-5 he also got an ovation.

Later on in the evening, the public address announcer said that the fans should stay in their seats to find out who was selected as the meet's outstanding athlete. This drew plenty of laughter from the audience since their boy C. K. was naturally the recipient.

We expect that this support that Yang drew from the crowd was one of the chief factors that contributed to his world record. What inspires this devotion of an athlete would be an interesting study and there is no doubt that it is responsible for some fine performances.

An interesting sidelight to Yang's effort was the fact that he had only vaulted 14-7 in competition before the Portland meet. It also was the second time that he had ever used a fiberglass pole in a meet.

Dave Steen

The other big event of the meet was Dave Steen's first sixty-foot shot put. It was Steen's first time at 60 feet but he showed he's ready to stay there as he was consistently over that mark.

Look for even better things from Steen during the spring season. Carl Cluff of the Oregon Journal pointed out that Steen has improved almost ten feet since his freshman year at Oregon. Ten feet in three years is quite an improvement and it doesn't look like the end is in sight.

Bounce Ball

Oregon's basketball team didn't quite make it up to an even 7-7 win-loss record in their game with Washington. They had the chance to but weren't able to capitalize on it.

Just after the halftime, the Ducks spurted into the lead but their defense fell apart and the Huskies opened up a big lead.

It was particularly disappointing that defense was the losing factor for the Ducks since Coach Steve Belko had done such a fine scouting job on the Washington offense. We watched practice the two nights before the game and we didn't see the Huskies doing much that Belko hadn't had the Oregon third-stringers doing in the practice sessions.

The Webfoots are going to have to play quite a bit more consistently if they hope to salvage anything out of their next six games when they play five on the road against California, Idaho and Oregon State. Tough teams all.

Marty Frank

One disappointment for Oregon fans in the Indoor Meet last Saturday was Marty Frank, who decided after warmups that he wasn't ready to compete this season and scratched himself from the pole vault. Frank was the leading vaulter on Oregon's NCAA championship team last season, but is going to face stiff competition for the number-one spot this year from sophomore Gerry Moro.

Both Frank and Moro are ready to hit the 15-foot mark anytime now, which should give the Duck cindermen some added strength in the pole vault. Moro has competed in the British Empire Games and a meet in Toronto already this winter, so Frank had better get ready to do a little vaulting if he expects to stay with his teammate.

Extra Duties

An added highlight to the track meet was the fine performance of Gov. Mark Hatfield in the shot put. Hatfield served as a judge in that event and did an excellent job of holding the tape measure while the various tosses were measured. Probably some of the friends of higher education in Oregon would like to see Hatfield take up shot put judging as a full-time job.

Wayne Morse To Visit For IRL Conference

Sen. Wayne L. Morse and William Sanders, assistant secretary general of the Organization of American States, will speak at the 16th annual conference of Oregon High School International Relations League, February 7-9 at the University.

The conference, jointly sponsored by the Oregon Education Association and the University of Oregon, will draw approximately 600 high school students and their advisors.

"Alliance for Progress" will be the topic of the IRL program. The sessions will be a model conference of the Inter-American Economic and Social Council at the ministerial level.

SEN. MORSE, who heads the U.S. Senate Latin-American af-

fairs subcommittee, will discuss U.S.-Latin American relationships Friday at 10:25 a.m. Sanders will speak on the OAS Saturday at 9:45 a.m. Both talks will be held at McArthur Court and are open to the public.

Sanders had been a senior officer of the U.S. Foreign Service before assuming his present position. He has held numerous executive positions in the Department of State, among them coordinator of U.S. preparations for the International Conference on the Law of the Sea, held in Geneva in 1955.

He served as U.S. representative on the United Nations committee on the Question of Defining Aggression in 1953, and was U.S. representative at the signing of the Four Power Statement on the West Indian Conference and the Caribbean Commission in Washington, D.C. in 1950.

IN ADDITION to his official activities, from 1948 until 1953, he conducted a seminar in international law and organization at Georgetown University. He also is the author of studies and articles on problems of international law, international organization and diplomatic practice.

Another conference speaker will be Robert Loring Allen, associate professor of economics and assistant director of the Institute of International Studies. He will speak at the annual IRL banquet, Friday, in the Student Union.

Arrangements for the sessions are being made by LeRoy Graymer, executive secretary of the Oregon High School IRL. He also is a Teaching Fellow in political science at the University.

IEC Announces Change in Flight

The charter flight to Europe sponsored by the International Education Center has been rescheduled for a West coast departure rather than the East coast departure as previously announced.

IEC director Gary McCormack said the flight cost will be increased from \$254 to \$340 for the different route. The plane will leave June 1 from Vancouver, B.C., arriving in Amsterdam, The Netherlands.

The return flight will be Sept. 14 from Copenhagen, Denmark, to New York City. The new schedule will give passengers about a week and a half more in Europe than with the original plan.

McCormack said the change was made to benefit participants on the West coast who will save money by not having to arrange transportation to New York. The previous schedule called for a round trip, New York-Amsterdam, June 15 to Sept. 8.

"The flight changes are better all around," said McCormack, since transportation to New York is usually \$164 by plane for an individual. The increase amounts to \$86 and the flight will probably be non-stop, he added.

Chess Champion To Give Exhibition

Samuel Reshevsky, five times United States chess champion and an international grand champion, lectured on chess Monday at 7:30 p.m., and will give an exhibition of skill at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the SU.

At his lecture Monday, Reshevsky discussed the particulars of the game, demonstrating games played in international meets and setting up difficult patterns.

The chess exhibition Tuesday will feature fifty chess players from throughout the state in an attempt to win or tie Reshevsky. In the five years that Reshevsky has played at the University he has never been beaten, and only occasionally tied.

Anyone who wants to play Reshevsky should sign up and pay fees in room 301 SU. The cost is \$1 a board for students and faculty, and \$3 for non-students. Participants should arrive at 6:30 and are required to bring their own boards and staunton pattern chess men.
