Tax Abolishment To Be Introduced

SALEM (AP) — The "Liberty amendment" to abolish federal personal income taxes will be introduced in the Oregon Legislature for the first time.

But its four sponsors said Monday they do not endorse it. They said they would introduce it just to provide a public hearing for the conservative groups which sponsor it.

This amendment has been approved by five or six states.

It would propose to Congress that it pass a constitutional amendment to abolish the income tax. It also would forbid the federal government from engaging in "any business, profession, commercial, financial or industrial enterprise."

MacMillan Says DeGaulle Guilty

LONDON (UPI) — British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan, smarting from his country's common market defeat — has described French President Charles De Gaulle as guilty of "foolly."

De Gaulle, the roadblock to British membership in the market, has, in Macmillan's view, forgotten that post-war unity among the Western Allies checked the spread of Communism. Macmillan went so far in the nationwide radio and television address as to picture the present Government of France as "looking backward, not forward."

Macmillan said the French veto yesterday at Brussels — in the Minister's words, "brought the negotiations firmly and ruthlessly to an end."

Macmillan added that France had killed Britain's application for membership in the market not because the talks had been doomed to failure, but because they had reached the brink of success.

Meredith to Remain

OXFORD (UPI) — The first Negro student at the University of Mississippi says he intends to remain in school.

At a news conference today, James Meredith said he would return to the University for the Spring semester. But he indicated he was doing so reluctantly.

In a statement, Meredith said "I have concluded that the 'Negro' should not return to the University of Mississippi."

But he added, "however, I have decided that I, J. H. Meredith, will register for the second semester at the University of Mississippi."

His announcement was greeted by a cheer from some 100 Negro spectators at the news conference.

Since his entry at the University, it has cost the Federal Government more than four and one half million dollars to protect Meredith at the school. Bloody rioting at his enrollment resulted in two deaths and scores of injuries.

Gov. Signs Salary Bill

SALEM (AP) — A bill to give Oregon legislators a \$3,000 annual salary plus \$20 a day expenses for the first 120 days of a session was signed into a law Wednesday by Gov. Mark Hatfield.

The Oregon legislature meets once every two years, so the bill could give the lawmakers a salary of \$8,400 for each session they serve.

Before the voters took legislative pay out of the state Constitution last year, legislators were paid \$1200 a session.

The bill was the first to pass both houses and be signed by the governor this session. The House passed it 41-18 last Friday, and the Senate passed it 17-12 Tuesday.

The calendar was light for both houses of the legislature Wednesday, with little happening but the introduction of bills.

The House Taxation Committee got its teeth into the first of the important revenue bills Wednesday, as it began hearings on a bill to levy a 1 per cent tax on business profits.

The bill's sponsor, Rep. Victor Atiyeh, R-Portland, said it was to relieve part of the business inventory tax.

Atiyeh's bill got general support from the witnesses appearing before the committee, but many of them said it didn't go far enough toward replacing the inventory tax, considered unfair among many businessmen.

Red Propaganda Increases 20%

ALBANY, New York (UPI) — The President of the Free Europe Committee said today that Communist radio propaganda has increased 20 per cent in the past nine months.

John Richardson Jr., addressing the annual meeting of the New York State Publishers Association, cited figures contained in a radio Free Europe report entitled "Communist Foreign Radio Services."

According to the report, radio propaganda transmitted abroad by 13 Communist nations, including Cuba, has increased 20 per cent from April 1, 1962 to Jan. 1, 1963.

The 13 nations now broadcast more than four-thousand hours of overseas radio programming a week in 63 languages, Richardson said. The Soviet Union leads in air time with 13-hundred hours a week, followed by Red China with nearly 700 hours. East Germany and Cuba rank third and fourth respectively.

"One cannot doubt the high priority given by the International Communist Movement to the matter of conquering the minds of men everywhere," Richardson said. "This is a key element in Communism's goal of ultimate world conquest."

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Attempts Made To Curb Nuclear Force Policies

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Nuclear force — the defenses required against it — and the attempts to curb it make the news front today in Washington, New York City and Moscow.

IN WASHINGTON, Defense Secretary McNamara said the U.S. has a fleet of bombers and missiles primed for instant retaliation against any Communist attack. McNamara reported the U.S. has about 650 bombers on 15-minute ground alert, more than 200 Atlas, Titan and Minuteman missiles and 144 Polaris missiles ready to retaliate.

Also in Washington, the State Department criticized Canadian Prime Minister Diefenbaker's stand that continental defenses no longer fear bombers. The department said defense against manned bombers would be needed at least through the 1960's, and that continental defense will not be complete until Canada accepts nuclear warheads for its air defense forces.

IN NEW YORK CITY, U.S. Ambassador Foy Kohler said he believes Russian Premier Nikita Khrushchev is serious about reaching a nuclear test ban agreement with this nation. Kohler has returned to America from his Moscow post for, as he put it, "normal routine consultations."

AND IN MOSCOW, a radio commentator said Russian scientists are prepared to build automatic seismic stations for use in policing an East-West nuclear test ban. Soviet Premier Khrushchev has said he would allow such instruments to be installed on Russian soil in a reciprocal agreement with the West.

Defense Secretary McNamara told Congress of Russians in Cuba today.

Appearing before a closed-door session of the House Armed Services Committee, McNamara said about 17-thousand Soviet military personnel remain in Cuba.

He added they probably control the principal elements of the island's Air Defense Command.

McNamara said U.S. surveillance of the island, in his words, "has not revealed the existence of strategic weapons systems" since the Soviets pulled their medium range missiles out in October.

He declared the U.S. is convinced that the 42 missiles withdrawn from the island in the aftermath of the Cuban crisis were real missiles and not dummies.

The U.S. commander in the Pacific has predicted victory within three years for U.S. supported South Viet Nam in its Guerrilla war with Communist rebels.

Admiral Harry Felt said, too, he does not think Red China or Communist North Viet Nam will intervene directly in the South-

east Asia war.

He said, "they don't want to fight the United States because they know how strong we are."

As the Admiral made his statement a series of Communist

bombing attacks erupted in South Viet Nam. It stirred fears that the Reds have launched a long-threatened campaign of terrorism and assassination against Americans.

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
