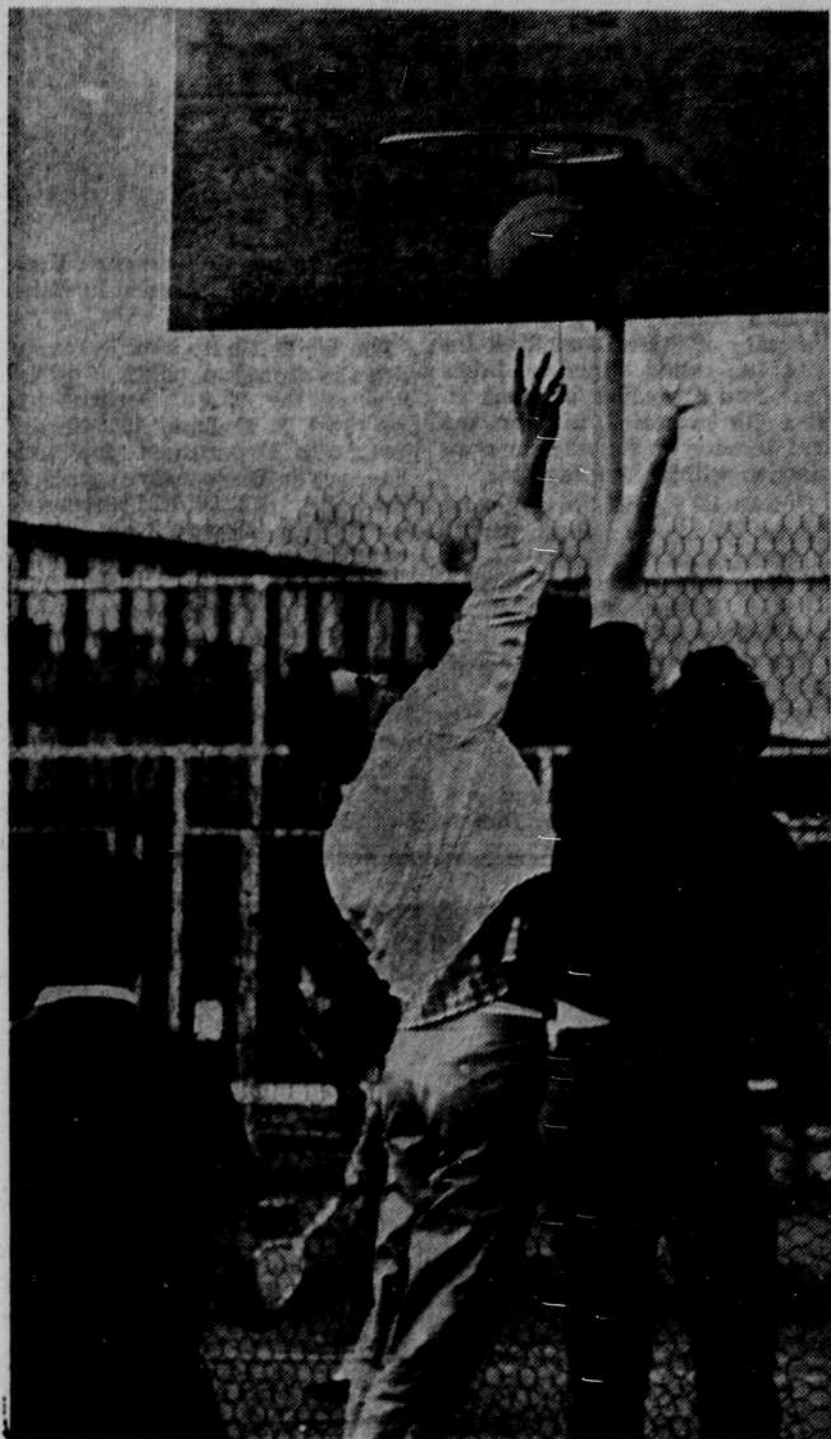




MIDTERMS notwithstanding, lower-class men are enjoying the unseasonal weather; last week it was snowball fights, this week basketball.

YMCA Celebrates 75 Years On Campus

Signs posted on campus, reading only "75th," have been objects of curiosity for the past week. It may now be told that 75 stands for the 75th anniversary of the YMCA at the University. The YMCA, the oldest student activity on campus, was established in 1858. It has grown to include numerous activities of varied interest.

OF PRIMARY concern are international programs, including AFRIC-ORE and IND-ORE. Members of AFRIC-ORE, under the direction of Arnold Temu, graduate student in history, study Swahili, a language of Africa, and also the culture and history of the country. The IND-ORE program, includes the study of the South-west Asian countries, India in particular, and the Hindi language.

The Hindi classes are taught by Mrs. S. P. Varma, wife of the visiting professor in political science. Mrs. Varma has a Ph.D. in the Hindi Language. The class meets at 7 p.m. in Room 204 of Chapman Hall on Wednesdays.

Faculty members from the various departments meet weekly for the YMCA's Inter-Disciplinary Seminar. Members participate in an informal discussion of subjects of international interest.

Dialogues is the Y's weekly discussion program during which two faculty members who hold opposing views or look at a subject from different perspectives, debates an international issue. After the debate students may raise questions, while the faculty members lead discussion.

A NEW YMCA program which starts Tuesday, February 12, is Scripture Scrutiny. This group discusses the Bible from a historical perspective, raising questions of the validity and meaning of the Scriptures. The speaker at the first meeting will be Alfred Bloom, religion instructor. Any

YMCA members may participate in this group.

A new program, still in the planning is the Little Brother Project. The YMCA, in cooperation with the Lane County Juvenile Authority, proposes to have members "adopt" little brothers who have been, or might be, in trouble with the Youth Authorities. By following the example of their big brothers it is hoped that the boys will develop into useful, active citizens. The big brothers will take their little brothers to athletic events and other activities, such as fishing and hiking, which will hold the youngster's interest. Applications for big brothers are now being taken.

Community service programs such as these have been the goal of the University YMCA for the past 75 years. This year the Y operates under the leadership of Tom English, president, and Charles Palmerlee, director.

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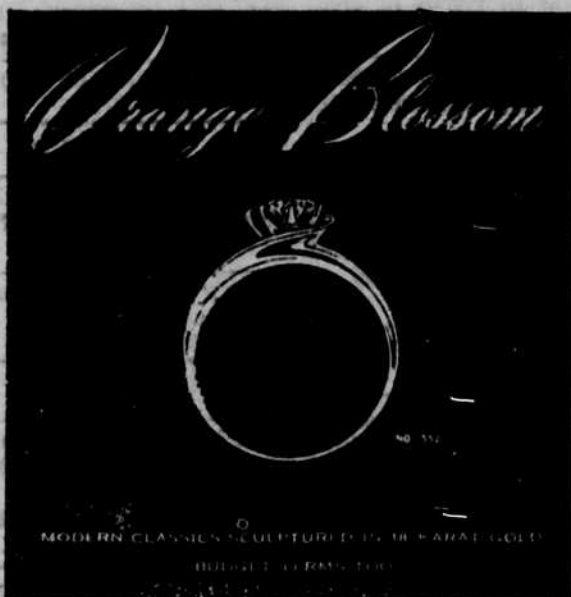
