involved, would make having a housemother impractical.

DWIGHT HERR, president of Philadelphia House, agreed with Kunze that there was "no need for them (housemothers)," and said he was strongly against it.

Tom Martinson, president of the recently-formed Inter Co-Op Council, told the Emerald that co-ops must adopt policies to conform to their basic purpose—to provide inexpensive living for its members. "This means not paying out money for things we don't need, like housemothers," he stated.

Questions that remain to be answered if the faculty adopts the plan for resident adult supervision include (1) when it would become effective and (2) how much of a financial burden it would be on fraternities and co-ops.

Dean DuShane said his recommendation would be to have all fraternities that are able to provide facilities be required to have housemothers by next fall term, if such a plan is adopted by the faculty. Those houses that aren't able to comply, he added, should be given a year to provide adequate facilities.

He pointed out that the University has for the last 10 or 12 years required that fraternities

provide accommodations for housemothers when they remodel or rebuild. This action has been in anticipation of compulsory housemothers. Since most houses have made provisions for a housemother, DuShane noted, it wouldn't be such a financial problem now.

Hanson said fraternities would have to do some "re-budgeting" if housemothers were required. He stressed he didn't feel it would be an "extenuating hardship" on the Greeks.

O'Connell said, frankly, "Are housemothers worth the money."

Bert Clausen, president of Sigma Chi, said his fraternity had a housemother for one year but it "didn't work out." "At that time the members felt she was trying to take over and run the house like a sorority."

"I don't think men are ready for them on this campus," he explained.
