Willie Mays Joins Hundred Granders

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Willie Mays has joined a select circle of only three other players in the history of baseball, he has become a "hundred grander."

The incomparable center fielder has signed a contract calling for more than 100-thousand dollars with the San Francisco Giants, thus moving into the same salary bracket once dominated by Joe DiMaggio, Ted Williams and Stan Musial. DiMaggio and Williams, the first of the "hundred granders" are in retirement while the aging Musial no longer commands that wage.

VICE PRESIDENT Charles Feeney of the Giants said Mays "is in a good bracket" and added "that's about it" when asked if it was inside the hundred grand range.

Mays is 31 and is heading into his 13th season as a Giant. Last year was one of his finest, 49 home runs, and a batting average of .304 while driving in 104 runs.

On Sept. 12, 1962, he fainted during a game at Cincinnati and was sidelined a few days. But he returned to spark the Giants to the pennant in a playoff with the Los Angeles Dodgers.

AFTER THE season he underwent a thorough physical examination and pronounced in much better shape than other men his age.

Oregon's Ducks will be going after a sweep of the season series when they tangle with Washington State's Cougars in two games at Mac Court this weekend.

STEVE PELKO'S Webfoots will be out to improve on an 8-12 record when they face Marv Harshman's invaders. WSU, with one more game to play before taking on the Ducks, currently is sporting a 5 and 15 mark.

Oregon has already beaten the Cougars three times this year. The Ducks beat WSU 67-57 at the Far West Classic, and dumped them twice more in a series at Pullman, 60-51 and 52-44.

Outside shooting is the main strength of the Cougars, who have been suffering from inexperience thus far this season. Six foot-one inch junior guards Byron Vadset and Jim Walton do most of the scoring for WSU. Other starters are 6'3" Dale Ford and 6'7" Al Thompson at forwards, and 6'8" Ted Werner at center.

WERNER and Ford are both sophomores, giving the Cougars a starting line-up composed of two sophomores, two juniors, and one senior. Thompson is the only senior on the opening quint.

Ford should be familiar to Webfoot fans—he was the starting quarterback for WSU when Oregon's football team scored a 23-10 win over the Cougars in the 1962 homecoming game.

Although WSU has only totaled five wins in twenty games this year, they do have one claim to fame. Harshman's troops scored an upset over Idaho—with Gus Johnson in the line-up! On the strength of that one game, the Cougars must be regarded as a capable team.

OREGON is expected to open this weekend's contests with the same line-up that started against Oregon State last week.

That quint would include 6'5" Steve Jones and Jim Johnson at forwards, 6'7" Glenn Moore at center, and 6'2" Elliott Gleason and 5'11" Bob Yates at guards.

JONES continues to lead the Ducks in scoring with a 14.5 ppg average. The 6'5" forward's average took a bad drop with last weekend's games, as OSU's Steve Pauly clamped a tight lid on his scoring touch, holding him to a total of five points in two games.

Friday night's game will feature a special halftime attraction. The Cheney Stud Courteers, from Tacoma, Washington, will be in town to perform. The Courteers, composed of Tacoma youngsters from 11 to 15, do a ball handling and dribbling routine much like that of the Harlem Globetrotters.

After suffering an earlier 9-5 loss to the Ducks, the Oregon State ruggers have been improving with every game, and have added some new strength to their club. The first Devine cup game, which was played in Corvallis, was a hard fought aggressive battle, and the added Oregon State personal could spell the difference between victory and defeat.

With Oregon taking two losses on the road, the Webfoot ruggers will be out to get back into the

win column and to maintain their dominance of the Beavers. The Ducks boast big, strong forwards, and a swift backfield. Fans can be assured of some spectacular tackling and exciting break aways by the swift backs.
