The A.S.U.O. Senate is not above criticism but neither for that matter, is the Oregon Daily Emerald. In this particular case I think the Emerald's criticism of the Senate is without basis and is perhaps motivated by something other than a desire to see the Senate act responsibly.

The Emerald stated that the Senate made its decision after five minutes of questioning. This is not quite true. The Senate interviewed each candidate for at least five minutes (there were four candidates) and in addition discussed at some length the merits of each candidate. Most of this discussion centered around Mr. McCormack and the ex-student body president of Vassar.

Consider the information the Senate had to base its decision on. In the case of the ex-student body president of Vassar, an excellent presentation and an impressive experience in student government. In the case McCormack, also an excellent presentation, but in addition two years experience in A.S.U.O. government in which time most senators have had a chance to judge his capabilities personally. McCormack is one of the

founders of the International Education Center and the Council on International Education. He is presently serving as Director of the International Education Center and from my own observations I can say that he has done an outstanding job. The Senate is also aware of this as are most people in student government.

Perhaps the ex-student body president of Vassar would have made a better senator; I don't know, the Senate didn't know and I don't think the Oregon Daily Emerald knows. I do know that the Senate elected a good senator. The ex-student body president's past experience is impressive but this and the interview could not provide the Senate with the same information as a man who is well known and respected and who has demonstrated his ability through outstanding work in A.S.U.O. for two years.

When you look at it, I think that the Senate made the most responsible decision it could make.

Soprano Plans Recital Sunday

Exine Anderson Bailey, soprano, will sing at a University faculty recital at 4 p.m. Sunday in the Music auditorium.

An associate professor of voice in the University School of Music, Mrs. Bailey will be assisted by faculty members William Woods, piano; George Boughton, violin; and John Hamilton, organ.

MRS. BAILEY will sing the Lieder Kreis (song cycle), a series of twelve songs by Robert Schumann. She will also present the Solokantaten, "Singet dem Herrn" (Sing unto the Lord) by Dieterich Buxtehude, a cantata for soprano solo, organ and violin, with the text taken from a Medieval Anthology. William Woods will play the ten variations on "Come unagnello" by Sarto, composed by Mozart.

Mrs. Bailey sang with Metropolitan Opera tenor Brian Sullivan in the Charter Day presentation of Mozart's "The Magic Flute." She has appeared frequently in the northwest in concerts with orchestras and in recitals.
