

Webfoots Wind Up Season Against Oregon State Five

Two games left.
The two biggest games of the year for Oregon's basketball team. This weekend the Ducks hope to knock off the NCAA-bound Oregon State Beavers. A sweep over arch-rival OSU would be a highly satisfying way for the Webfoots to finish the season.
A sweep from the Beavers

would give the Ducks a 13-13 won-loss record. Oregon would also win the Chancellor's trophy which is presented each year to the winner of the season's series between the two schools.
"Discipline" Belko said has accounted for the four Duck victories in the last six games. The Oregon coach hopes this carries over into the weekend series with the Beavers.

In this recent string Oregon has been averaging around 80 points a game. Even with this scoring surge Belko doesn't believe that OSU will be as easy to score against as the other teams.
"They're a fine defensive team," said the Duck coach, "and we'll have to move the ball a little longer to get the shots we want. Our kids have learned to discipline themselves extremely well, however, and I'm confident we'll have the patience to play for the real good shot this weekend."
Oregon will be counting heavily on the frontline of Moore, Jones and Johnson when they square off against Mel Counts, Terry Baker and the rest of the Aggies Friday and Saturday. Both games start at 8:00. The Friday game is at Eugene and the Saturday game at Corvallis.

Oregon's Cinder Crew Eyes California Team

Oregon's Webfoots, defending NCAA champs, open their 1963 track season with a dual meet against California March 16 in Eugene. The Ducks swept to ten straight meet victories last season, and ran off with the top honors in the NCAA finals held in Eugene.
Once again the Ducks look as if they will be one of the best in the country. Although, the Webfoots have lost Dyrrol Burleson, national collegiate record holder in the mile and two-mile, and Jerry Tarr, high hurdles champion, the Ducks will be able to take up the slack with their great depth in the distances, and Mel Renfro in the hurdles.

toss. Junior Les Tipton, who upped his personal record by over 34 feet last year, has a 238-4½ toss to his credit. John Burns has posted a 236-11 heave, and sophomore Mike Hodges threw 206' as a freshman last year.
THE WEBFOOTS will have their perennial power in the distances. Keith Forman, with a sub four-minute mile to his credit (3:58.3), and Vic Reeve and Archie San Romani, both capable of four-minute miles this year, head the Duck's distance hopes.
In the middle distances, the California cinder crew has a slight edge. Dave Archibald, fourth in the AAU as a freshman, has a 46.3 clocking in the 440, and also a 21.3 time in the 220.

STRENGTH in the field events is the term to describe the Duck's team. With Dave Steen, the nation's latest 60-footer, leading the Webfoots in the field events. Steen turned in his best ever with a hefty 61-5½ toss in the Oregon Indoor Invitational Meet. Supporting Steen is a quartet of javelin entries, all with tosses bettering the 200-foot mark. Ron Gomez, a lefty, tops the Webfoot javelin parade with a 244-1

Duck Mermen Nab Second Place Spot

Oregon's swimmers wrapped up the 1962-63 season by taking second place in the Far West Championships held in Seattle last weekend. Washington won the meet, compiling 154 points in the two day competition.
The Ducks were close with 127½. The other three schools were left far behind. Oregon State was third with 49 points, Idaho was next with 45½ points and Washington State finished in the low spot with 38 points.
"We placed more men in the finals than any of the other schools (20 of 22 competitors made the finals), but we couldn't take the first places," Coach Don Van Rossen said.
Both Oregon and Washington placed 10 men on the All Conference team.

Webfoot Ruggers Grid For Spring Contests

Oregon's ruggers are prepping for a busy spring vacation schedule after their come-from-behind 8-5 win over the highly tooted Vancouver Meralomas last Saturday.
On March 21, the team takes on the powerful University of California ruggers at Berkeley. Two days later the Ducks will vie for top honors in the Monterey tournament along with many other schools from the coast.

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Webfoot Matmen Wind Up Season

For the third time in Mike Reuter's five-year term as Oregon's wrestling coach the Ducks took fourth place in the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Wrestling Championships.
Oregon State, with two individual champions and three runners-up, won the championship. Portland State captured second place and Central Washington finished third, only two points ahead of the Ducks.
Three things stood out in Oregon's favor in this year's championships:
• Oregon improved its eighth-place finish of a year ago by four positions.
• Bob Keeney took the 167-pound title by decisioning Central Washington's Leroy Johnson, 9-2.
• Doug Muck finished second in the 147-pound class as he was decided by Gerald George of Central Washington, 5-3.
After the first day's matches, Oregon was in seventh place. Only Charley Warren, Muck and Keeney survived the first-round matches. Muck and Keeney scored pins. The Ducks' five other entries were eliminated.

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
