



discrimination to the attention of the fraternity members it will be all for the good."

In a statement to the Emerald University President Arthur S. Flemming said he "concurs with the chancellor's report to the

state board.'

DAN O'CONNELL, president of Inter-Fraternity Presidents' Council, said "if Chancellor Lieuallen and President Flemming are satisfied that discrimination does not exist this should be enough for the legislature. It would seem unnecessary for the legislature to take the trouble to make additional inquiries.

Lent said he designated in the resolution for the bureau of labor to conduct the investigation. In Oregon the Bureau of Labor administers all civil rights laws.

A BUREAU of Labor spokesman told the Emerald that the fraternity discrimination investigation "would be an entirely new field." For this reason "the procedure might be different than that which we usually follow. Generally we work along the lines of persuasion and conciliation."

A hearing for the Lent bill has not yet been set.
