

# Willamette Relay Field Looms Bulky

SALEM — Generally trackmen have to work up a sweat to break records, but from the way entries have been piling up in the 13th Annual Willamette Relays, all it will take is putting on a uniform.

TO DATE, 63 high schools and 21 colleges are "in" with more expected, and the vast number of

participants is approaching 2000 for the March 30 classic at McCulloch Stadium.

The attendance record, however, isn't likely to be the only mark to fall, as meet director Ted Ogdahl has come up with another classy field.

Field event marks could take the biggest beating if personal previous "bests" can be attained by the various stars.

**LATEST ENTRY** is Buck Kipe, winner of the Washington State Indoor javelin throw last weekend with a 243'10" effort. A similar toss would shatter the current 224'11 3/4" standard set in 1960. Kipe is a transfer from DePauw University to Washington State, but he will not be eligible for Cougar competition this year.

Another spear thrower will

make the action interesting, as Montana State's Ken Christison owns a best of 230'3" and has been over the 200' mark already this spring.

**MONTANA STATE** has another possible record breaker in Al Sarisky, a 23'8" broad jumper. He will be aiming at the six-year-old mark of 23' 4 3/4".

Ken Ashley of host Willamette has a leaping chance at the 6'8 1/4" high jump standard set by Hans Albertson of Gonzaga in 1960. Ashley won the 1961 NAIA crown with a 6'9" leap. Also, Willamette's Denny Charlton has exceeded the 165'7" discus toss record in practice, so could be a definite threat in his specialty.

The Statesman mile could produce a new record with the likes of Don Bertoia (4:07), ex-Wash-

ington State; Gary Baker (4:13), OSU Rooks; and prepper Wendell Cox (4:16), Hillsboro in the running. Bill Dellinger set the 4:10 mark in 1956.

Tickets for the relays will be sold at the gate for \$1 (adults) and 50 cents (children).

## Bowling Leagues Set First Meet

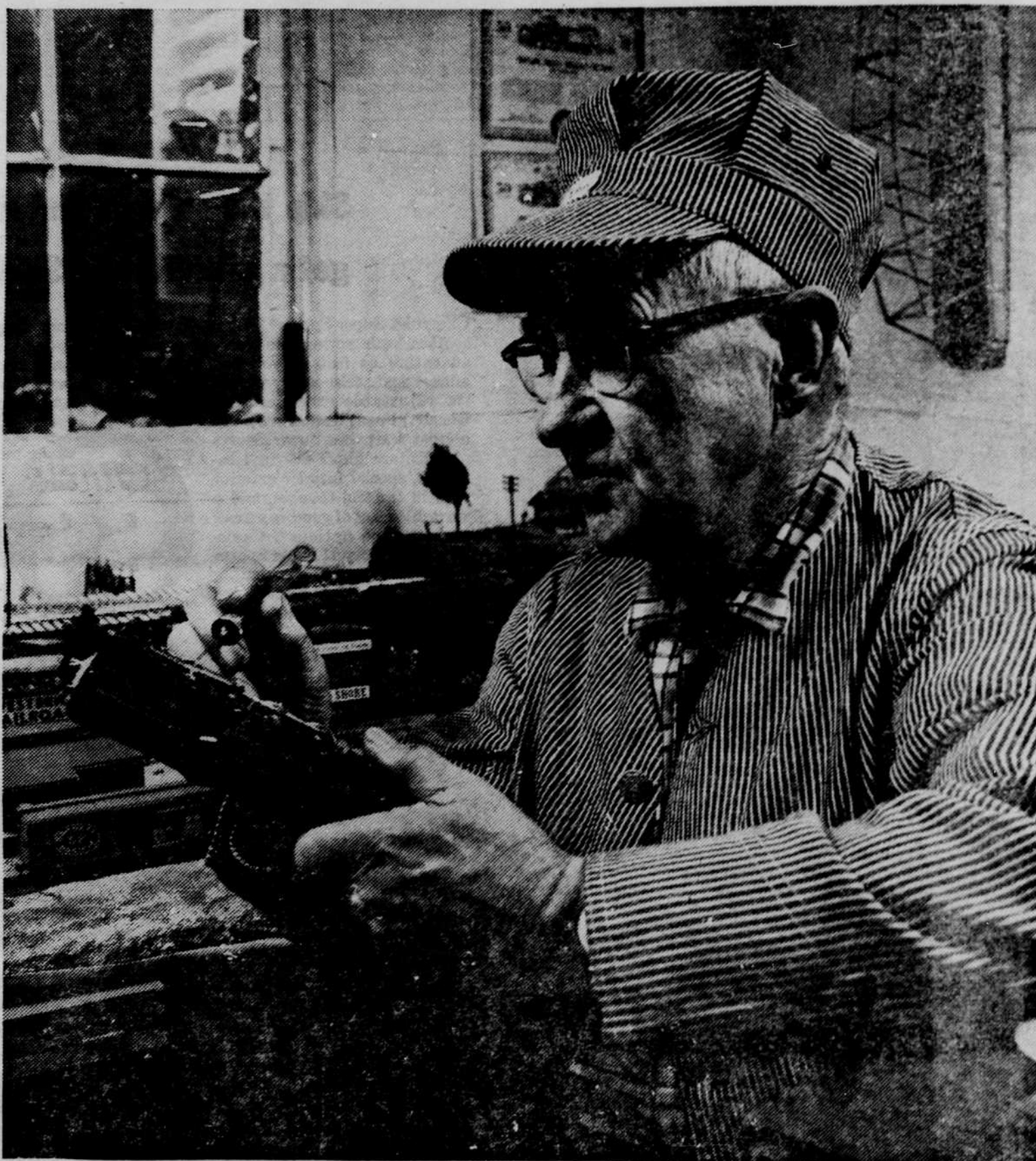
Spring bowling leagues for students and faculty will be organized next week, according to Bob Ackerman, SU recreation director.
