A Philosophy of Student Government

tee is doing. I think we can accomplish the same results with similar guarantees through a student-faculty committee composed equally of faculty and students. I think the new discipline code, now being formulated by the present student-faculty committee is close to what the students themselves would ask for in a bill of rights, at least in its philosophy.

Q. What exactly do you see as the role of the ASUO President?

A. I think, with good reason, the founding fathers of the U.S. constitution, and of our own state constitution, have created an independent executive. I think they did this for more reasons than just to have an executive to administer the decisions of the legislature. Our student body president ought to be an innovator and a thinker who attempts, on his own, to bring to student government the changes needed. He ought to feel free to disagree with the legislative body at any time. Most important, he should not be bogged down with administrative responsibilities to that body.

Q. What do you see as the role of the student press as related to student government?

A. First, the student press, if it is to have any backbone at all, must be free to criticize anywhere within the University community, and on any matter that affects our students, not only as students, but as citizens outside the University. As it relates to student government specifically, student government ought to encourage the watchdog activities of the press. Technically, it is possible to regard the Emerald as a very limited organ because the source of some of its income is from student fees. But there really isn't any halfway mark for a press. If its scope is limited on one issue, such as student government, it can no longer be regarded as independent or free. Its a curious thing, and I have often wondered in times past when the student government and the press have been at odds, how student government would feel if the Emerald suggested similar restrictions should be placed on the Senate.

Q. Finally, what do you see as the more important roadblocks to an educationally effective student government at this University?

A. I think the most effective roadblock has been heredity. The students at the University of Oregon have inherited an activity system and a network of awards and honoraries that not only aren't adequate, but are, in actuality, a throwback to an

earlier day. We give awards and rewards for participation in activities that are no longer significant as they relate to the academic process. These activities in themselves aren't evil, it is only sad that we haven't exposed our students to the type of activities that actually may prepare them for the kind of life we profess to want them to lead. Our incoming freshmen are socialized into a myriad of activities of the nature of Canoe Fete, Dads' Weekend, Moms' Weekend, Homecoming, etc., that may enable them to become decent administrators, but which in no way require them to introspectively scrutinize their personal values or the values of the society around them. This nation needs people who care, and who are willing to accept the fact that it is never too early to try to do something about problems larger than on-campus activities.

Our student government is, in reality, an outgrowth of the student government of high schools throughout the country. These student governments produce

the kind of thinking that is inevitable when administrators and most educators treat student group effort as immature and insignificant. The words, "student government" have come to mean, "mickey mouse". At its best, student government should be the end result of interest created in the classroom.

Either we begin to reward those who are most concerned about the under-privileged Negro in this community, and in their home communities, or student government will remain the same. Either we recruit the intellectual who avoids the electoral process, but who is most concerned with the apathy of our University students towards censorship in government, toward violation of procedural rights by government investigating committees, and who is concerned with the plight of the Southwest African, or we will stand still. Either student government will take up the vital issues confronting our generation, or our student government will be held in contempt by its constituents.
