

Right and Left Unite To Destroy Middle

Liberal and Conservative student groups united here today to form the society to prevent extreme middle-of-the-road groups from infiltrating University student organizations.

In a joint statement presidents of the Young Communists and Young Fascists Youth Groups announced, "We are playing both ends against the middle."

YOUNG Birchers chairman joined the College Americans of Democratic Action in a statement which said, "We have nothing to fear but fear itself unless it's the extreme middle."

"Neither the extreme right or the extreme left can do as much damage as the extreme middle-of-the-roader. This leads to outright surrender," ASUO Senator Do Nothing announced.

Gus Hal, chairman of the University Department of Government, said the extreme middle is to define, but he will attempt to do so in a course on "Student Affairs—It's role in the University."

GUEST lecturer will be John Snake, dean of the Oregon State Penal Institution. Another guest lecturer on the extreme middle

will be Rutti McCone Sylvester, measurer of waists for the Miss America contest. "We have been measuring and assessing the political disengagement of some mighty cool middles for a long time," he said.

Shah Moncolli Zubitzw Mse of the Asian kingdom of Zhigquei announced that his 'Ace Belly Dancers Inc. will continue to promote the extreme middle."

"We find the middle quite interesting and indeed, enchanting," the 79-year-old Asian monk announced.

Young Republicans refused to comment on the new group. **BENITO MUSCRAT III** said his Young Democrats organization will contribute to the new campus movement by inviting a noted Chicago gangster to address the student body.

University President Snarther Stlemming said he will oppose the new group. "If there is anything we don't want during a legislative year it's free discussion and thinking; this is incompatible with a legislative year and the legislature as well. The University community will not be delighted to hear about this. I hope they will take the early opportunity given to them at this time on this day to disband. It is quite an opportunity for this University community," the community president said.

ASUO PRESIDENT Snell Sloggesmitte said, "Let me say this about that." "This," he said. In a later statement he announced that the group will probably serve a good purpose if it continues to undermine interest in

international affairs. "We can't put up with this kind of attitude about that," he said.

Snillvim Verplants, chairman of the Snellingson Memorial Student Union plank, said "Oh, willy nilly."

The committee had named the Union board as a subversive organization. The chairman was also termed 'persona non grata.'

The Side May Be Saved; SU May Be Traded For It

Informed sources close to the SU and Co-op Boards told the Emerald yesterday that the Side can be saved after all.

The Co-op Board has decided after mature consideration that they will need more space than the 1100 sq. feet they would gain by using the Side Building.

They feel that about 5,000,000 sq. feet would house their new collection of over-priced textbooks. This area is about the size of the SU, including the new addition, the Oregon office, and the SU Board Chairman's office.

Because of this re-evaluation, the co-op board has decided that the SU would make a much better addition.

Two additional reasons cited by this informed source are that (1) no tearing down or remodeling would have to be done, and (2) the SU is more centrally located than the old co-op buildings.

THE NEW plan would allow the University to take over the present Co-op buildings. The Co-op building on 13th would be used as an under-21 soda bar, and the Co-op building on Kincaid, being outside the dry zone, will become an over 21 hang-out.

(The University, searching for ways to get more money since as

usual it doesn't look like they will get it from the legislature, has decided that too many student fees are going to Maxie's and the Pad. Sources close to the Economics department say that the plan to enter free competition with these two establishments originated there.)

YR's Will Bring Billie Sol Estes

The University Young Republicans have announced intentions to sponsor a speaking tour for Billie Sol Estes, Texas businessman. YR's, active in campus and state politics this year, recently opposed bringing Harry Bridges to speak on campus.

"There are many reasons why Bridges should not come," said Phil Abuster, president of the YR's, "but the main one is that we are afraid kids will get him mixed up with Lloyd Bridges. Estes, on the other hand, couldn't be confused with anyone."

Estes, who is a leading figure in politics, business, and penal systems, will probably not be available for an engagement at the University for some time, Abuster said. "But when he can, we hope he will come. He will exemplify the Republican party's opposition to the image of wealth and affluence."

Wilma Sturdley, Young Democrat's President told the Emerald that her group will oppose bringing Estes to the campus, "because we are afraid he might be confused with Estes Kefauver."

Sidney Grime, a student, said, "Already I'm confused."
