Paul G. Travers, a representative of the Chesapeake & Potomac Telephone Co., said Miss Japp was identified by a friend who said she called him at a fraternity house on the campus. On this occasion, Travers said, the conversation lasted 20 minutes and ran up a bill of \$19.65.

Miss Japp said that she started making the calls as a joke.

YD's Back HUAC Referendum Here

The Young Democrats unanimously approved a resolution in support of the Civil Rights committee-sponsored HUAC referendum to be placed on the April 17 General Elections ballot.

Jim Teasdale, President of the YD's, said "The HUAC referendum should become a major issue in the upcoming student body elections."

"I expect to see all serious candidates express their opinion on this issue: HUAC is just as relevant to this campus as dormitory policy, NSA or Ugly Men contests," Teasdale said.

In other action the club heard plans of the proposed series of speakers on the American labor movement and the YD convention to be held May 10-11 in Salem.

State Senate OK's Parent's Exemption

The Oregon Senate passed "unanimously Wednesday a bill to let parents claim students as income tax exemptions if the parents provide at least half of the student's support."

The present law makes it impossible to claim a student as an exemption if he makes more than \$600 a year.

The bill would also provide full exemption to be claimed by a surviving spouse if a joint return is filed for both deceased and surviving spouse.

The State Tax Commission has estimated that the measure would cost the state \$65,000 annually.
