

All-University Grades Improve Winter Term

The all-university grade point average increased from last fall term from 2.479 to 2.53, according to the winter term grade reports released by the Office of Student Affairs Thursday.

ALL LIVING organizations made the required 2.0 GPA. However, Pi Kappa Alpha, with a 2.212 and Delta Tau Delta with a 2.219, were the only fraternities failing to make 2.25.

All of the major categories showed improvement from fall term. Men's upper class dorms led the way with an improvement from 2.43 to 2.509.

Also showing raises were women's upper class dorms from 2.587 to 2.689; all sororities from 2.64 to 2.68; all women's average, 2.582 to 2.6435; freshman women's dorms, 2.388 to 2.49; all men's

average, 2.392 to 2.435; all fraternity 2.3818 to 2.4385; and freshman men's dorms, 2.2 to 2.312.

SORORITY Delta Zeta posted the highest grades on campus with a 2.84. Close behind were Cloran Hall, 2.83; McClain Hall, 2.82; and Kappa Alpha Theta, 2.80.

Phi Kappa Psi led the men's organizations with a 2.79. The Campbell Club freshmen were second at 2.738, and third was Watson Hall at 2.716.

The sorority all-pledge average was 2.582, while the fraternity all-pledge average was 2.192.

Three fraternity pledge classes failed to make a 2.0. These were Delta Tau Delta, 1.953; Delta Upsilon, 1.894; and Pi Kappa Alpha, 1.858.

as well as the possibility of inappropriate use of authority. At the present time, formal safeguards are woefully lacking.

"(6) A faculty-student committee should be appointed to develop a code governing all phases of student conduct and to specify all procedures for administering such a code. The suggested code and procedures should be set within the framework of the recommendations contained in the present report. . . . We believe that the work of other committees with more limited concerns in the area of student conduct might well be integrated with the activities of the committee herein proposed.

"(7) The recommendations contained within this report, and the discipline code that is developed on the basis of these recommendations, should be brought to the attention of persons throughout Oregon (in particular, parents of prospective and presently attending University students) through a systematic and comprehensive program of explanation and interpretation. . . . We do not think that we should concede the necessity of what we consider to be an unwise code of student conduct because of alleged community insistence without first trying to gain acceptance for a system of regulations consistent with the educational goals of a University."

THE MINORITY report came in the form of an amendment to the motion which will go before the faculty in their May meeting.

This amendment would strike out all the first recommendation concerning moral development, and would also eliminate all recommendations except those to set up a committee and to publicize read as follows:

Parts of the minority report to the committee's results.

"Students of the University have a dual position in society which requires that they live under at least two sets of rules . . .

"The enforcement of certain rules of conduct for women and not for men is consistent with practice and tradition in society generally. The different code is not intended to create different classes of citizens, but is intended to recognize that society generally accords women a different role than men.

"... we believe in the adoption of a procedure wherein students charged with serious breaches of University disciplinary rules would have their cases presented before an independent disciplinary officer. . . . Appeal from the disciplinary officer's decisions should then be limited to error in the proceedings."

WATSON'S alternate proposal calls also for a student discipline officer directly responsible to the president.

He would have the student-faculty discipline committee available for appeal, but appeal would not be automatic.

Finally his report says: "Insofar as possible, and under the guidance and suggestion but not direction of the new committee, students should be encouraged to formulate a code of behavior for living groups. These would be in the nature of housekeeping rules. The AWS, for example, should be encouraged to formulate women's hours and other rules."
