Duckling Thinclads Invade Corvallis

Oregon's Frosh track team moves into Corvallis Friday to face Oregon State's Rooks in their first dual meet competition of the year. The program will get underway at 3:30 p.m.

Chuck Bowles' Ducklings will be competing for the second time this spring. Two weeks ago, the yearling thinclads easily dominated an all-comers meet in Corvallis.

MANY OF THE new recruits turned in very good performances in that early season competition, and on the strength of their marks figure to dominate Friday's action.

Gordy Payne was probably the most impressive Duckling performer in the first meet. The ex-South Eugene quarter-miler turned in a fine time of 48.2 for the one lap event.

That time was a new Frosh record, and he augmented it by winning the 220 in 22.2 and running a 48.1 anchor leg for the victorious mile relay team.

KEN MOORE was another impressive performer. He set a Duckling record of 9:15.2 in the two mile, and is expected to compete in that event and the mile Friday.

Another Duckling, Don Scott, figures to dominate the 880. His time in the event at the all-comers meet was 1:55.4.

MARCIAL HUNTER, a Corvallis boy, will return home Friday to show the old fans some pretty fair form in the high hurdles. Hunter, Oregon A-1 champ last year, skimmed the sticks to a 15.1 time in the first meet.

Ducks were rained out at Linfield Wednesday.

Don Kirsch's Ducks will invade Corvallis for a game at Coleman Field Friday at 3 p.m. The Beavers will return the favor by coming to Howe Field for a 3 p.m. contest after the BYU track meet on Saturday.

RECENT WEATHER conditions make both games doubtful propositions, however. Both the Oregon and OSU diamonds have been hard hit by this week's rains.

Although Howe Field has an infield covering, the outfield is covered by standing water inches deep.

If the games are played, they will match two potent teams.

OREGON STATE won the N.D. crown last year, but was eliminated in the Western Regional NCAA tournament by Santa Clara, which went on to finish second in the finals.

Thus far this season, OSU has run up an 11-5 won-lost record. The Beavers are ranked among the top ten teams in the nation.

Oregon had reeled off 12 wins in a row prior to last weekend's double dumping at the hands of Portland State. The Webfoots are also ranked in the top ten.

OSU'S PRIDE is little south-paw hurler Cecil Ira, a third team All-American last year. The crafty lefthander is 4-1 so far this year, with 27 strikeouts and only eight walks in 38 1/3 innings.

Steve Clark gives State veteran support on the mound, and sophs Ron Stevens and Steve Olson have impressed this spring.

In the offensive department, the Beavers have three .300 hitters. Leading the team is Frank Peters, a basketballer who is getting a late start, with a .381 mark on eight hits for 21 trips to the plate.

AL LEHRER, an all-league outfielder last year, is second with 20 for 55 and .364. Catcher Dave Hayward, another basketball refugee, is third with seven for 20 and .350.

Doug Stahl, the starting short-

stop, leads the club in RBI's with 12. Stahl was the 1962 conference batting champ with an average of .392, but has hit only .254 in pre-conference play this season.

OSU coach Ralph Coleman rates Oregon as the "team to beat" in the league. He regards the Duck pitching brigade as possibly the best in the West.

MEMBERS OF that Duck brigade who will probably start this weekend's games are Robbie Snow and Lloyd Gallaher.

Snow is 3-0 this season, and Gallaher, a left hander, is 2-0 without yet having given up an earned run.

Third baseman Ed Pettengill leads Duck regulars in hitting with eight for 20 and .400. He is followed by John Livingston, an outfielder with 12 for 33 and .364.

SHORTSTOP Bob Porter leads the Webfoots in RBI's with eight.
