

Webfoots Eye Cougar Clash

After being roughed up by Southern California and Stanford, the Oregon track team seems to have an easier task this Saturday when it takes on Brigham Young University.

Past performances this spring favor the Ducks but some of the times are awfully close and Oregon will have to be at their best or the Cougars could make the meet a little closer than predicted.

Rain has hampered the Duck spikers this spring and they have been slow rounding into form. However, last Saturday at Palo Alto, the Ducks came through with some outstanding times. With a break in the weather this weekend, some of the Ducks could conceivably even do better.

BRIGHAM Young also got off to a slow start, and just like the Webfoots, they are now beginning to turn in some good times. How-

ever, it appears that the Cougars do not have enough depth to overcome Oregon.

Keith Forman is one Oregon thinclad who is apparently reaching top form, as evidenced by his 4:00.1 mile and 8:56.8 two mile in last week's meet with Stanford. Keith will run the two mile this week and is hoping for a weather break to improve his time.

RAY VAN ASTEN will concentrate on the 880 for this meet and try to qualify for the NCAA Championships. Van Asten will be up against some stiff competition from teammate Lewis Powell and BYU's Dean Lundell. Powell has run 1:52 and Lundell 1:52.2.

Oregon record holder, Marty Frank, has made the 15 foot club in the pole vault, and if he keeps up the good work, he should win a blue ribbon for the Ducks. Second place should be a tossup between Oregon's Bob Watson and Gerry Moro and the Cougars Jim Williams and Danny Boyle. All

four have cleared 14-6.

BOB TOBLER of the Cougars should take a blue ribbon in the 440, having run a 46.5 last week against the Air Force. The discus appears to be BYU's with Dick Mertes and Salem's Ron Mickle both having thrown farther than Oregon's Dick Brown.

BYU could also take first in the javelin and intermediate hurdles. Terry Thatcher has exceeded the distances of Oregon's Les Tipton, John Burns, and Ron Gomez in the spear event. Howard Parker and Mike Douglas of the Cougars both have times quite a bit ahead of Mel Renfro in the intermediate hurdles.

If Renfro is approaching top form he could upset BYU in this event. He is the definite favorite in the high hurdles and should win the broad jump, although he could be pressed by BYU's Emmett Smith who has gone 24-0.

Figuring on past performances Oregon comes out a 94 to 51 win-

ner. However this could fluctuate either way depending how some of the athletes run. A good number of the thinclads on both teams have yet to match times and distances of last year and given the right conditions they could foul up the form charts.

Oregon's Female Shooters Undeclared In Competition

A woman can give a man a lot of bull. But to those women on the women's rifle team, "bull" has a little different denotation.

So far this year the University of Oregon's female shooters are undefeated in five matches. They have defeated Middle Tennessee State, Loyola University, the University of Florida, Oregon State University, and Boston University. In their last match the women competed in the University of Illinois Invitational in which 80-150 women's teams were entered. According to Sergeant Barnett of the ROTC department, who is coach of the team, the Oregon women have a very good chance of winning.

IN THE PAST the women's rifle team was an interest group rather than a club and was not very strong until this year. This year the club has blossomed into a winner under the coaching of Barnett and the leadership of team captain Jane Begg.

Any woman who is a student at the University may join the team—with or without any experience. In fact, some of the members of the team had no experience until joining the team.

Team members are:

• Jane Begg, a senior from Portland majoring in education. This is Miss Begg's first year of competition.

• RUTH YOGI, from Maui, Hawaii, and a freshman in education. Miss Yogi has been competing since her freshman year in high school, and was Hawaii state champion as a senior. Strangely enough, Miss Yogi had the second highest average on the varsity rifle team this year—varsity team members being both men and women. She had the highest score until the last night of competition.

• Edie Harnden, a junior in foreign languages from Toledo, Oregon. Miss Harnden competed on the women's team as a freshman and as a sophomore at Oregon.

• Naida Isacson, a freshman in general arts and letters from Stelacoom, Washington.

• RICKIE HART, a freshman in foreign languages, has been competing since her high school days at Madras.

• Bonnie Allingham, a junior in English from Albany.

The women use the ROTC facilities and are sponsored by the Women's Recreation Assn. All women fire standard (ROTC) .22 target rifles. The rifles weigh 13-lbs. and 13½-lbs.

ALL WOMEN'S matches are postal matches—that is, the Oregon team fires at the ROTC rifle

range, while the opposing team fires at the rifle range on their campus. The scores are exchanged to determine the winner of the match. Not all women fire at the same time; each may fire at her own convenience. Although all members of the team may fire, only the top five scores are entered for the team.

The women fire in many different types of matches. They may fire sitting, prone, kneeling and standing or any combination of these four positions. Should the women fire ten shots each in three positions there are a possible 300 points for each individual. A bullseye counts 10 points. Points decrease with each ring toward the outside of the center ring. Any shot outside of the bull counts as no points.

Sergeant Barnett attributes this year's success to the fact that the women are high in ability and to individual practice. Barnett said that although some women don't have time to practice at all because of study and class schedules, many of them practice eight to ten hours weekly.

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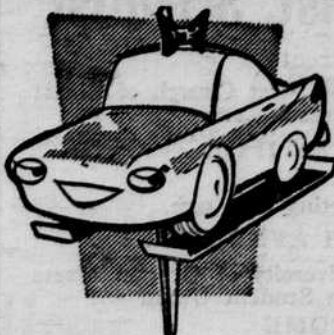
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
