'Books For Asia' Makes Progress

Near the checkout stand in the library there is a square wooden box with the words "Books for Asia" printed on it. Usually this box is empty. But appearances are deceiving. Since last May, the University has sent 1101 books to universities, colleges, seminaries, and libraries throughout Asia.

THIS PROGRAM under the sponsorship of Head Librarian Carl Hintz was started in 1956. Its beginning resulted mainly from a combination of students' desires to help and many letters received by the University library from libraries destroyed during the war that requested books, said Hintz.

Each summer, the University library packs the books collected during the school year and sends them to the Asia Foundation in San Francisco for distribution.

ACCORDING TO Hintz, the reason the Asia Foundation was chosen to distribute the books is because the Foundation is able to send books to all countries in Asia including Pakistan, Ceylon, India, Japan, Korea, and others.

"Books are sent only to institutions, such as universities, colleges, and libraries," said Hintz.

Since its start, the University has sent 6974 books and 5327 journals to the Foundation.

UNTIL TWO years ago when the box was installed, books were collected during a drive held at the end of spring term.

Calls from people desiring to donate books during the year led to the installation of the box in the library, which is emptied twice a day.

Rallies Broken Up

AMMAN, JORDAN (UPI)—Police broke up student anti-government, Pro-Nasser rallies in Amman, Jordan, and in Jerusalem, and heavily-armed guards kept Jordanians penned up in their homes for the third day.

A study procedures course will be offered at 1 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday. This course will cover comprehension, critical analysis, textbook-centered study techniques and study procedures for specific subject areas.

BOTH CLASSES will run for a four-week session beginning April 29.

Students experiencing academic difficulty are encouraged to seek individual counseling at the University Reading-Study Laboratory.

University students are entitled to University Reading-Study Laboratory services through payment of the \$5.00 University Counseling Center registration fee.

The method used will be discussion with minimal expectations regarding outside study.

Drill Competition Held Saturday

Portland University captured both first place trophies in the Saturday competition when the University of Oregon hosted seven drill teams in the Willamette Valley Air Force drill competition.

The University Arnold Air Society competed with cadet drill teams from Portland University, Willamette University and Oregon State. University Angel Flight hosted drill teams from the same universities but did not compete themselves.

Judging for the men was in three areas: precision, fancy drills and close order inspection. Angel Flight drills were a combination of precision and fancy drills.

Willamette placed second in both contests, and Oregon and Oregon State tied for third in the Air Force drill competition.

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University Seeks Talent For Theatre

Carnival Theatre, a summer theatre operation at the University, is searching for talent to participate in the productions, to begin June 17 and continue through August 10.

THE THEATRE will have a revolving repertoire of musicals, revue, melodrama, comedy, children's plays, and drama. The schedule calls for a new play to open every Friday and Saturday. Thursday will be used for dress rehearsals for the opening plays,

and remaining Tuesdays and Thursdays will be used for repeat performances. Club Intime, to resemble a nightclub, will be presented on Wednesdays.

The cast will be recruited from interested applicants who are qualified by experience or training. A few selected high school students, nominated by their teachers, will be accepted as full time members. Some part time members will be accepted, but all, both part-time and full-time, must sign up for the entire season.

QUALIFIED members of the company may receive regular University credit in theatre and other subject matter.

A rotating system will allow every member to participate in the varied types of theatrical activity such as acting, stage management, directing, scene building, lighting, costumes, promotion, box office, ushering and stage crew.

The outdoor amphitheatre next to the University Theatre will be the stage for the productions.

Lund To Speak On Pakistan At Browsing Room

Ernest H. Lund, associate professor of geology, will speak on customs of Pakistan and show color slides at a Browsing Room Lecture Wednesday.

Lund, a member of the University faculty since 1957, spent the 1961-62 academic year as a Fulbright lecturer at the University of Karachi in West Pakistan. The stay in Pakistan was part of a round-the-world trip for Lund and his wife.

"Nowhere in our trip around the world did we find so many people who live the way their ancestors did 100 years ago," said Lund, in reference to Pakistan.

One major problem of Pakistan is lack of education, said Lund. Only about 25 per cent of the people are literate. Lund noted a big gap between the educated and the uneducated in Pakistan.

Lund received his B.S. in geology from the University in 1944. He received his Ph.D. in 1950 from the University of Minnesota. Lund taught previously at the University of Florida.

Lund has written a number of articles for scientific journals. He also belongs to several honoraries, including Phi Beta Kappa of which he is vice president of the University's chapter.

Wallace S. Baldinger, director of the University's Museum of Art, and professor of art, will be the discussion leader for the lecture.

Browsing Room lectures are held each Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. in the Student Union and are open to the public.

No Morality

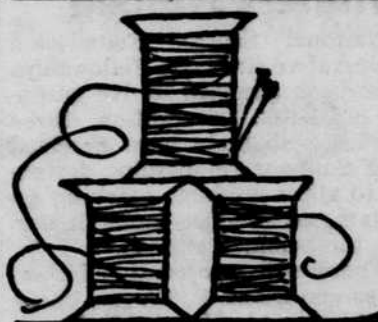
Emerald Editor:
