Grad Student Gets \$4,000 Fellowship

David Bradwell, a graduate student in the Department of Economics, has been awarded a \$4,000 fellowship from the Resources For the Future, Inc.

The purpose of the fellowship is to encourage outstanding graduate students to undertake dissertations involving the application of the social sciences to natural resources problems. Bradwell's proposed research topic is the "Sequence and Timing of Water-Resource Development in the Saskatchewan River Basin."

Resources For the Future, Inc., is a non-profit organization, with headquarters in Washington, D.C., established to advance the development, conservation, and use of natural resources through programs of research and education.

Bradwell, who holds a bachelor of science degree in engineering from the University of Bristol (England), is completing his second year of graduate study at the University.

Peace Corps Tests To Be Given

Peace Corps Placement tests will be given Saturday at the Post Office building in Eugene. Anyone with the equivalent of a high school education is eligible to take the test.

The Peace Corps test is not competitive, and there is no passing score. The purpose of the test is to help the Peace Corps determine the overseas assignment for which applicant is best qualified.

Volunteers must be American citizens at least 18 years old. Married couples are eligible if both qualify and have no dependents under 18. To qualify for the test, fill out a Peace Corps questionnaire and bring it to the test center or send it to the Peace Corps, Washington 25, D.S. Questionnaires are available at all Post Offices and in the Peace Corps Office in room 306 of the Student Union.
