

Law Students Debate NSA Question

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would abridge the freedom of speech of students who should disagree with any decision made by the national group. He pointed out that freedom of association was a protected freedom of speech, and would be applicable to the NSA matter.

HE CITED the case of IMM vs. Street as a legal precedent. That dispute was raised when union members questioned whether their dues could be used for partisan political activity. Cass said that although the Supreme Court did not get to the constitutional question, and that the statute which allowed the unions such activity was improperly constructed, the court did term the statute "evil."

He continued, "I have no doubt that the State of Oregon and the State Board of Higher Education would be acting unconstitutionally if they should expend our funds for NSA membership."

ROBERT Ackerman, who opposed Cass and Grebe, said that the question of the legality of NSA membership belongs in a court of law. He said it was not a matter that could be settled by law school students or the ASUO Senate.

He said he was disturbed that only one side of the story was presented to the Senators.

"I FIND THAT I am a minority of one and a committee of one in the law school," he said. "Yet when I come out into the real world I have a mandate of 1,700 students behind me. This is the

best of all possible worlds."

He said that he would concede that the question of the legality of NSA membership was open, but that Cass and Grebe had presented no evidence that would indicate the illegality of the move.

HE ALSO questioned the timing of the presentation of their views. He said that they should have pointed out the legal difficulties before students voted on the NSA ballot measure. He said they neither presented their evidence publicly nor signed the advertisement to vote "no" on the measure. The advertisement was run in the Emerald April 16 and was signed by several students.

Ackerman said that his arguments were based on the "rule of analogy" of Justice Cordozo, in which a case is only an authority for the issue which it actually decides.

HE SAID that the cases raised by Grebe and Cass to support their points of view were not applicable to present situations. He said the IMM vs. Street case was not a matter of electorate decision but of an organization using private funds for political activity.

"It is unlike the present situation in which we have a student mandate decided in a situation in which everyone had the right to vote," Ackerman said.

HE READ Article X, Section B of the NSA constitution which says, "No substantial part of the activities of NSA shall be devoted to carrying on propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence

legislation."

He pointed out that in order for NSA to maintain its tax exempt status under the Internal Revenue Code it cannot "devote a substantial part of the activities of which it is carrying on to propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation. Nor can it participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distributing of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office."

IN HIS concluding statements Ackerman said that every student had had a chance to express an opinion on the NSA question through the ballot measure in the recent general election.

He continued, "There is also an opportunity for every student to run for NSA delegate, to articulate his own ideas and express his own opinions. I don't agree that anyone would be denied an opportunity to participate in NSA."
