Cabinets Uphold Majority Report

The combined ASUO Cabinets of outgoing president Neil Goldschmidt and incoming president Phil Sherburne voted 10-5 Friday to support the majority report on the student discipline code.

The vote came at a regular luncheon with University President Arthur S. Flemming.

The report is currently before the faculty senate, and will come before the full faculty at the May 8 meeting.

The ASUO Senate will make its recommendation as a meeting this Thursday night. ASUO President Phil Sherburne indicated that he will pass along the Cabinet's recommendation to the Senate.

The ASUO Cabinet consists of the Emerald Editor, ASUO Vice President, Heads of Houses President, AWS President, IFC President's Council President, Greater Oregon Chairman, and any individuals appointed by the ASUO President.

The discipline reports released two weeks ago by the student discipline committee, composed of six faculty members and three students, were three-fold: a majority report favoring a more liberal code of student conduct, a minority report essentially defending current discipline policy, and a report by chairman of the committee, Donald A. Watson, associate professor of finance.

Kitzhaber Writes Study of English

A book by Albert R. Kitzhaber, professor of English at the University, has been published by the McGraw-Hill Book Company as a part of the Carnegie Series in American Education.

The book is entitled "Themes, Theories, and Therapy: The Teaching of Writing in College." Kitzhaber is in charge of a Project English program at the University which is financed by a grant from the U.S. Office of Education. He is first vice president of the National Council of Teachers of English.

The book is the first book-length study of freshman English in American colleges. The author studied nearly 100 writing programs at as many colleges and universities to compile the material.

Lane Democrats Discuss Higher Education Budget

Democratic representatives and senators from Lane and Benton counties met last Friday to discuss the tentative changes in the Higher Education building priorities list voted upon Thursday by the House-Senate Ways & Means subcommittee on higher education.

The legislators will meet again Friday morning to review and discuss the higher education budget as well as other legislative problems common to Lane and Benton counties.

The legislators also discussed the possibility of establishing an office in Lane County where constituents might meet with both senators and representatives on Saturdays during legislative sessions and on other days of the week when the session is adjourned.

State Senator Requests UO Buy Cemetery

A state senator has suggested that the University buy at least part of the Pioneer cemetery property for expansion.

SEN. ALFRED Corbett (D-Portland) made the comment at the ways and means subcommittee on education meeting Saturday. The subcommittee is currently considering the higher education budget.

Monday, Corbett said that the University should "try and work out something so that at least part of the cemetery land can be used in a way that has community support."

He said that there are areas around the fringes of the cemetery that could be used and that some consolidation of graves would release land now being used for roadways and other services.

THE WAYS AND Means Committee is appropriating money for land purchases, the senator said, and would be interested in considering a plan to utilize the cemetery land.

Earlier this term the Campus Planning Committee considered the proposals of an architectural firm for using the cemetery land for classroom space or "open space"—either type of plan requiring purchase of the cemetery.

THE COMMITTEE declined to make any proposals this year in view of the attitude of the state legislature toward the higher education budget.

Another legislator, Rep Ed Elder (R-Eugene) has proposed "Elder's Compromise." This plan would involve constructing classroom buildings supported by columns over the graves.

New Professor Added in Poli Sci

Dr. James C. Davies, professor of political science at California Institute of Technology and one of the country's foremost scholars of political behavior, has been appointed a professor in the Department of Political Science.

The appointment, subject to confirmation by the State Board of Higher Education, is effective July 1, 1963.

Davies is a graduate of Oberlin College. He received his Ph.D. from the University of California in 1952. He also studied at the University of Chicago Law School and at the University of Texas Law School.

From 1950-51, Davies was a Research Training Fellow, under the Social Science Research Council, at Harvard University. In 1951 he went to the University of Michigan, where he was a Carnegie Fellow in Political Science at the Survey Research Center until 1953.

Davies has been on the staff of the California Institute of Technology since 1953. He has held full professorship since 1960. He was a visiting assistant professor at the University of California in Los Angeles during the summer of 1956, and a visiting associate professor at the University of California, Berkeley, during 1959-60.

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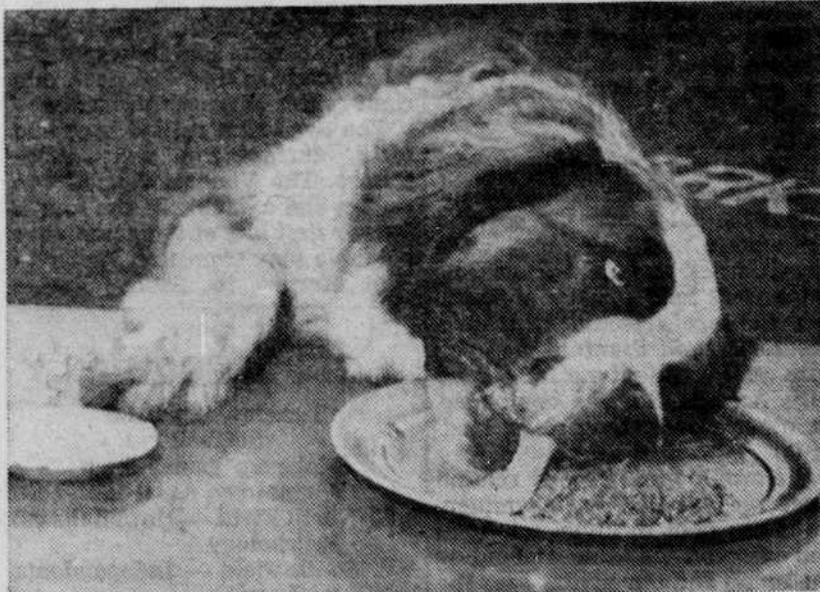
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
