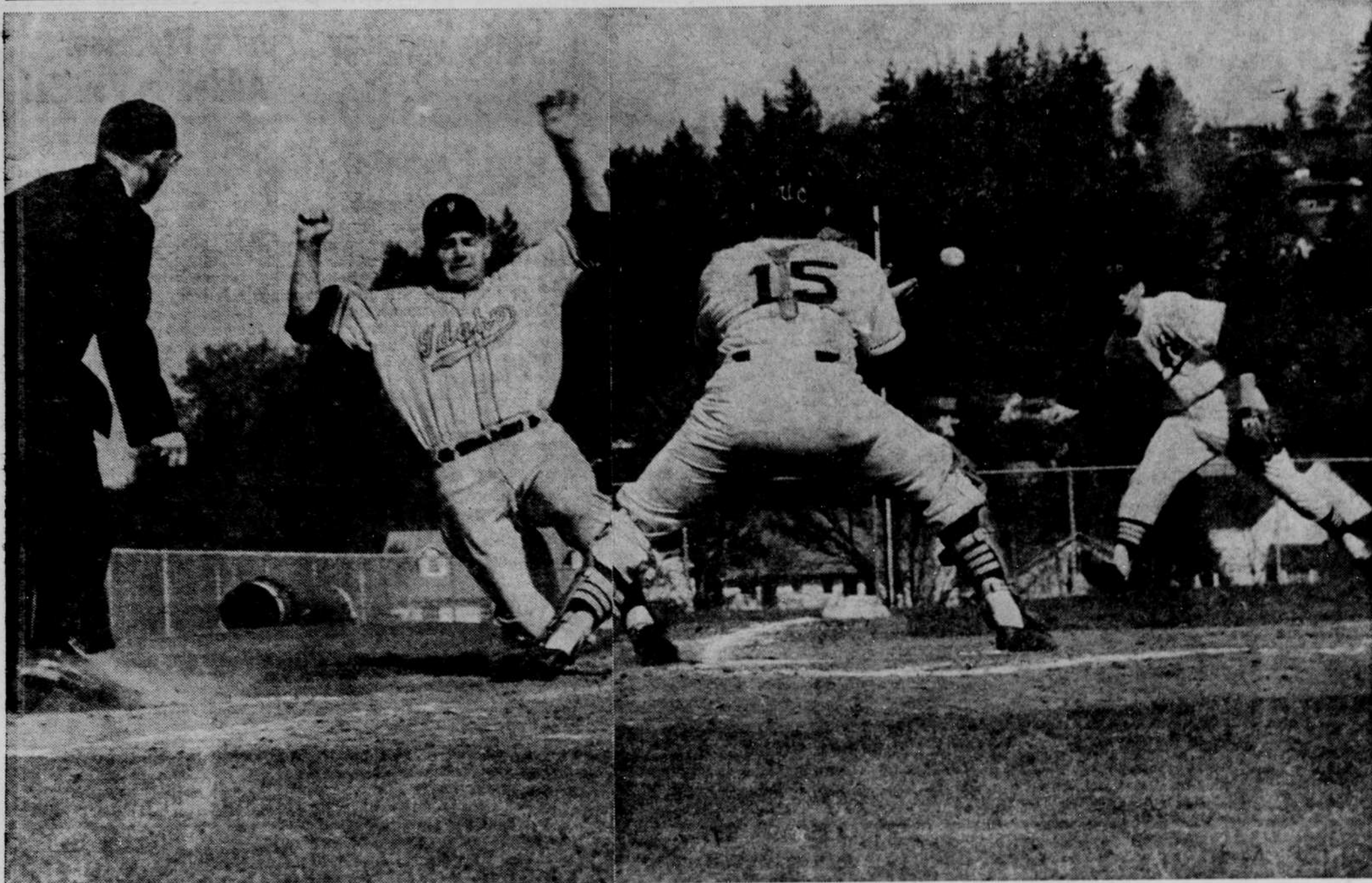

## Idaho Seeks Revenge Today

# Pettengill Leads Ducks To 3-2 Win

It was Fred Pettengill's bat that did it.

Pettengill, Oregon's third baseman, belted two home runs to provide his teammates with three

big runs and a slim 3-2 victory over visiting University of Idaho.

The win boosted the Ducks' Northern Division record to 3-0 and their season's mark to 17-2. The two teams will meet again today at 3 p.m. Coach Don Kirsch

plans to start Arba Ager (3-1) on the mound.

**ROBBIE SNOW** went the distance for Oregon to collect his third win of the season against no losses. Although Snow allowed a nine-hit attack by the Vandals, two key double plays in the fourth and the seventh curbed any further Idaho scoring. The righthander fanned six batters and gave up on one free pass.

Tabbed with the loss was Ron Bogue who held the Ducks to seven hits—three by Pettengill. Bogue, a lefthander, recorded six strike-outs also, while walking two. He was relieved in the eighth by John Dreps who staved off an Oregon rally.

**KIRSCH FELT** that Bogue had the Webfoots "off-balance." He added that except for the two long hits by Pettengill, "we were pretty dormant." The coach also commended the third baseman for his good game, both offensively and defensively.

Oregon opened the scoring in the second, as Cal Dean led off the inning with a single. Following was Pettengill who took a two-strike count and then sent the third pitch sailing 380 feet into right center and over the fence.

The two teams rallied back and forth during the next three frames. The Vandals copped two singles and a double in the fourth—their first hits of the game—but a double play from Bob Porter to Eric Hardin to Sandy Nosler

broke up the Idaho drive.

**THE VISITORS** turned the tables on Oregon in the sixth after Herb Dehning opened the inning with a single and came around on Chuck White's 370 foot blast over the center field fence. Mike Stowe followed with a double, but Snow retired the next three batters to quell the Vandals' efforts.

Oregon came back in its half of the frame to break the tie, as with one out, Pettengill cleared the left field fence with his 360 foot solo smash. The Ducks continued

a rally sparked by Sandy Nosler's single, but the team was cut short by Idaho pitching.

**THE WEBFOOT** nine tried to add an insurance run in the eighth, but a double play halted any more scoring.

Snow came through in the ninth, however, as he retired the three batters to face him, forcing each to hit on the first pitch.
