

Students Give Money To Put 2 Japanese through School

The best way to learn about the culture of another country is to meet directly with the people of that country.

Students in Paul S. Dull's Far East in Modern Times class have this opportunity of learning about Japan.

IN 1955 DULL and the students in his Far East class established the Oregon-Okayama Friendship Fund to put a Japanese girl through medical school.

With money given by the students Miss Junko Akiyama was able to attend four years of medical school at Okayama University in Okayama, Japan, and become a doctor.

The project was discontinued in 1959 when Dull, professor of history, was out of school, but was started again last year. The government of the prefecture of Okayama could not find a second girl to put through medical school, however, so a boy was chosen instead.

IN A FEW weeks the money given by students this year will be sent to Fumio Meguro, the boy chosen last year and now in his first year of medical school, to pay next year's costs.

Fumio has corresponded with Dull at the University, and students interested in Japan may correspond with Fumio. Dull said several sororities have corresponded with Miss Akiyama.

The friendship fund was started for two reasons, Dull said. "One is naturally philanthropic and the other is that the U.S. can stand more friends in the world."

"The program has done much to make the Japanese friendly to Americans," he said, "and has also benefited Oregon students. It gives them a chance to find out first-hand about Japanese culture."

THE PREFECTURE of Okayama was chosen for the project, Dull said, because he has lived there and knows the government officials and because it represents one of the few vestiges left of "old" Japan. Okayama is located on the main island of Honshu 90 miles south of Kobe.

Dull said that there has been more response to the friendship fund this year than in previous years. He said fraternities, sororities, cooperatives, dormitories and some individuals have contributed.

Contributions are 100 percent voluntary, Dull stressed.

ALL THAT is needed to put Fumio through one year of medical school is \$140, which pays for his tuition, books, and fees.

Dull said that any money collected over the \$140 will either be used to set up a fund in Japan to be used to pay next year's costs, or will be used to exchange Christmas gifts with Japanese orphans. In previous years Dull and his students have also exchanged gifts with orphans.

In 1959 Dull and his family went to Japan and he received from the Okayama government a citation for laudable achievement which he accepted in the name of his students who could not be present.

Harpham Cup Will Be Given At Sing

The Josephine Evans Harpham Silver Cup Award will be awarded at the All-Campus Sing Junior Weekend, to the living organization having shown the greatest interest in the house library program and recreational reading.

Organizations are judged in the number, quality and variety of books the students read, as well as the improvement of reading and house GPAs. House librarians have been responsible for a record of the organization's progress.

Mrs. Harpham, a resident of Eugene, established the award in 1948 to stimulate the development of student's reading habits. The award, in the shape of an open silver book mounted on a wooden standard, was won by Dymet hall last year; Dymet was then a women's dormitory. In subsequent years Rebec House has received the award four times and Tri-Delt three times.

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Easton To Present Geology Lecture

William H. Easton, author and lecturer, will be a guest lecturer at the University May 7 through 9.

Easton, head of the Department of Geology at the University of Southern California, will be a guest of the University Department of Geology.

He will present a popular public lecture on Wednesday, May 8, at 8 p.m. in 123 Science. The illustrated lecture will be on "Ge-

ology and Archaeology of Hadrian's Wall, England."

A graduate of George Washington University, Washington, D.C., where he also received his masters degree, Easton received his Ph.D. from the University of Chicago.

In 1955 Easton toured the United States and Canada as Distinguished Lecturer for the American Association of Petroleum Geologists. He received a Guggenheim Fellowship for 1959-60 for research in England and France.

The geologist's field is invertebrate paleontology, with specialization in the stratigraphic distribution of fossil corals. He is the author of a widely used textbook "Invertebrate Paleontology."

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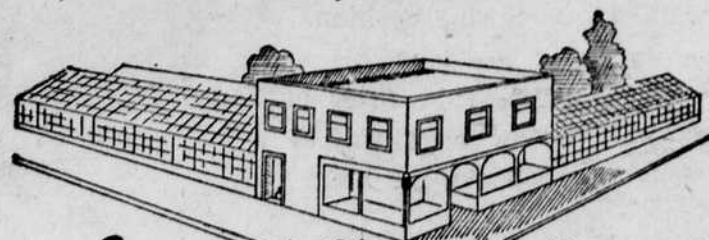
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
