Hulteng Story Defends Journalism Students

John L. Hulteng, dean of the School of Journalism, defends journalism students in an article included in the April issue of "The Bulletin," a publication of the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

In presenting "The Case for Journalism Education," Hulteng opposes those who feel that an academic curriculum can be replaced by "on-the-job" training.

Hulteng points out that journalism courses, in addition to teaching technique, also can involve philosophy, logic, ethics or law. Only in a good journalism program, he maintains, can students acquire a perceptive understanding of history and traditions of the press; acquire an understanding of the communications problems faced by reporters and other media; and acquire techniques geared to high standards of accuracy and excellence.

A former reporter in the Midwest, and later chief editorial writer of the "Providence Journal and Bulletin," Hulteng has been at Oregon since 1955. He was named dean of the School of Journalism in August, 1962.
