Browsing Room Talk Scheduled on France

Val R. Lorwin, professor of history and an authority on the comparative history of European social, economic and political movements of the 20th century, will deliver the Browsing Room lecture on "France and the Atlantic Community" at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday.

Lorwin's speech will touch on the resurgence of France since World War II, DeGaulle's rejection of Britain's entry into the Common Market, the recovery of French economic life since the war and the launching of the European Coal and Steel Community, which preceded the Common Market.

LAST MONTH, he attended a conference of the Society for French Historical Studies at Cambridge, Mass., where he was chairman of the Committee of Current

French problems in Historical Perspective.

Lorwin received his B.A. and Ph.D. degrees from Cornell University and his M.A. from Ohio State University.

Before coming to the University in 1954, he held positions at Ohio State University, Cornell University, Brooklyn University and the University of Chicago. In 1955, he was a visiting professor at the University of Lyon in France.

HE HAS also worked as an economist for the government and was an analyst for the Department of State from 1946-49. In 1957 Lorwin attended the 48th Session of the Salzburg Seminar.

He has also written numerous articles and a book, "The French Labor Movement."

Meet on Dunes Airs Pros, Cons

Opponents and proponents of the proposed Oregon Dunes National Park met in 150 Science Saturday for a day-long hearing before Sen. Lee Metcalf, (D-Mont.).

This is the fourth such hearing since 1959 on a bill which would make a shore-line area near Florence a National seashore park.

BOTH BACKERS and opponents of the bill were about equally represented at the hearing, but there was relatively little noise, as dunes hearings go.

The bills for the seashore area are sponsored by Sen. Maurine Neuberger (D-Ore.) in the United States Senate, and Rep. Robert Duncan (D-Ore.) in the United States House of Representatives. Definite opinions were expressed from several areas. Florence area residents generally said "no" to any kind of park proposal. Residents of other areas said the nation cannot afford to do without a national seashore park on the Oregon coast.

Business leaders from Coos Bay asked that the southern boundaries of the park proposed by Sen. Neuberger be pushed northward to allow that city room for industrial expansion. Most of these persons said they were not otherwise opposed to a dunes park.

DON ALLEN, executive secretary of the Governor's Committee on Natural Resources, on behalf of the Governor said, "I wish to make it clear that Governor Hatfield is in complete accord with the content inherent" in both the

Neuberger and Duncan bills. "We believe development of the area under discussion is the responsibility of the federal government."

He pointed out that one question which remains is whether the people of Oregon wish the proposed national park. He also suggested that the boundary could be extended to include Honeyman State Park, which the State Highway Dept. could transfer to the National Park Service.

REX WAKEFIELD, of Corvallis, formerly supervisor of the Siuslaw National Forest, gave strong support to Forest Service control of the dunes area.

He argued that it is not necessary to establish a national park on the Oregon coast, pointing out that 70 per cent of the 36,900 acres in the proposed park is already in public ownership.

Howard Campbell of Florence, representing the Florence Chamber of Commerce, said there are many public agencies in the dunes area "that have the effect of assuring that future generations have adequate access to the area."

R. E. Kerr of Eugene, representing the Oregon Farm Bureau, said "the question is not recreation or no recreation, but more a question of which agency should develop it." But he said Forest Service management is most logical for the area.

Another public hearing on the Oregon dunes park proposal will be held in Washington, D.C. Wednesday.

liquidating bonds for general use?"

Another said he didn't feel "we want to violate the trust of the people by reversing what had been decided at a previous election." "We must act in good faith the the voters," he added.

CHANCELLOR Lieuallen pointed out that there were two alternatives for financing: (1) revenue bonds and (2) general obligation bonds with the approval of the voters. He indicated that the revenue bond approach would involve a higher interest rate because of more risk.

"I don't think we're faced with a moral question," Lieuallen said in discussing use of general obligation bonds. He said that bonding attorneys had assured him of the legality of the proposal if it were worded properly and with certain "legislative modification."

William E. Walsh, president of the board, summed up the thinking of several board members when he said, "We should go to the people and not second-guess what the people think."

DURING THE joint session, the members of the subcommittee said there shouldn't be a "double standard" in construction of dormitories and classrooms. The legislators suggested that funds be pooled so a classroom would have as much priority as a dormitory, construction-wise.

When the Board couldn't decide on the moral and legal considerations of self-liquidating bonds, they took their problem across the street to the subcommittee. The result was a motion to urge the board to use general obligation bonds now, and then refer this type of use to the voters in May, 1964.

Rep. John D. Mosser (R-Portland) said he thought the public would "agree with us 100 per cent" about this extended use of self-liquidating funds.

Although several of the Board members hesitated to use revenue bonds because of the higher cost involved, they felt they had little choice. "We're up against a pretty rough deal. Our job is to get this job done," Chairman Walsh concluded.



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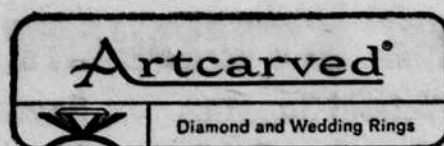


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
