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ings. The subcommittee had asked the state board to stretch its definition of self-liquidating in order to get some academic buildings within the state system's 1963-65 self-liquidating building program.

Chancellor Roy E. Lieualien told the Emerald that the "subcommittee clearly wanted us to issue general obligation bonds."

LIEUALLEN recommended to the state board that they do so, but in what he described as an "historically unusual" division, the board voted 5-3 against general obligation bonds.

Lieualien said the basic difference is that there is "no legal obligation for the people to pay for revenue bonds." Revenue bonds would come from student building fees in this case.

The main disadvantage of revenue bonds is that the interest rate would be from 1/2 to 1 per cent higher. Both types of bonds are paid off in the same method but revenue bonds may not be retired for five to ten years, said Lieualien.

THE BOARD felt the use of general obligation bonds for self-liquidating projects would be a violation of their obligation to the people since the voters have not approved it.

"We've committed ourselves to the people," said Lieualien, "and we have an obligation to the people to do as they voted."

The subcommittee was generally unfavorable to the chancellor's report. One member said that "revenue bonds are even more of a breach with the people."

LIEUALLEN ALSO presented the subcommittee with an earlier requested report on the University's Bureau of Municipal Research and its organization and activities.

At the close of the afternoon meeting, the group also asked higher education representatives to provide an explanation in writing of the method for enrollment projections. They also asked for a list of institutions and bureaus in the state system providing services.

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even if there is an injury. "I think the rule is silly and is also harmful to the players." Drinkwater said that he has had many good players and has wanted to use them all but couldn't. It would be difficult, he explained, to have two separate teams at one school as is done in Australia and New Zealand. There, the schools have more teams, so the substitution rule doesn't eliminate the good players.

One of the coach's players summed up the feelings of his teammates by saying, "He's really a great man who did a lot for the team, and he has the respect of all his players."

It was pointed out that ETV in the last two years has used only 300 out of a possible 2100 hours that have been available.

Leon Minear, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, was also opposed to the joint council. He discussed the possibility for having closed TV circuits in the next few years, which would go only to the classrooms.

Others who testified at the subcommittee hearing were representatives from the Oregon Division of the American Association of University Women and the

Oregon Parent-Teachers Association. Both groups also oppose the proposed joint council.

Kenneth Bragg, legislative fiscal officer, proposed the Joint Council for ETV during the Joint Ways and Means Interim Legislative Fiscal Committee.

At the meeting Tuesday night the subcommittee also discussed the bill which would limit the use of community colleges in Oregon. The subcommittee was still discussing this bill at press time.

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
