Constitution Revisions

It is hereby moved that the ASUO Constitution be amended as follows:

Article IV, Section I, Clause 2, shall read: "An elected representative of each of the four classes."

Article IV, Section I, Clause 3, shall read: "Fifteen members elected at large."

Article IV, Section I, Clause 4, shall read: "Two non-voting faculty members. These two faculty members shall be appointed by the President of the University. Their terms shall be for two years, except for the first year, when one of the members shall be appointed for a one year term."

Article IV, Section I, Clause 12, shall read: "One representative from women's off-campus housing; one representative from men's off-campus housing."

Article IV, Section III, Clause 2, shall be deleted.

Article IV, Section III, Clause 6, shall be deleted.

Article IV, Section III, Clause 7, shall read: "In the event of a simultaneous vacancy in the offices of ASUO President and Vice President, the Senate representative shall convene the Senate and carry out the election to select an ASUO President and Vice President for the remainder of the term of office."

Article IV, Section III, Clause II, shall be deleted.

Article VI. Elections.

Section I. Election dates.

Clause 1. There shall be an ASUO general election held after the third week and prior to the seventh week of Fall, Winter and Spring term. The general election shall be preceded by a primary election.

Clause 2. The Vice President of the ASUO shall be responsible for selection of the specific dates for the elections subject to the approval of the Senate.

Section II. Tenure.

Clause 1. The ASUO President, Vice President, five senators-at-large, the sophomore, junior and senior class presidents, vice presidents and senate representatives, the two unmarried off-campus representatives, two upper class dormitory representatives, the cooperative representative, the fraternity representative, and the married student representative shall be elected during the Spring term general elections and shall serve until their successors are elected at the next spring term elections.

Clause 2. Five Senators at large, the freshman class president, vice president, and senate representative, the fresh-

men dormitory representative, the foreign and the graduate student representative shall be elected at the Fall term general elections. The class officers shall serve until their successors are elected at the next Spring term election. The dormitory representatives shall serve until the next academic year. The five senators at large, the foreign and the graduate representative shall serve until their successors are elected at the next Fall term elections.

Article VI

Section II

Clause III. Five senators at large shall be elected during the Winter term elections and shall serve until their successors are elected at the next Winter term elections.

Section III. Qualifications for Voting.

Clause 1. Each student is eligible to vote for candidates seeking election for the following:

1) ASUO President and Vice President

2) Fifteen Senators elected at large

3) The officers of the voter's academic class; and

4) The representative from the living group classification in which he declares his intention of residing the succeeding Fall term.

Clause 2. Each foreign student is eligible to vote for the foreign student representative.

Section IV. Replacement

Clause 1. The vacancy of any office elected under this constitution shall be filled during the next ASUO election except those filled by special election as provided for under recall and the filling of the vacancies of the ASUO President and Vice President.

Section IV. Recall

Article I. The electorate shall have the power to recall an ASUO officer or senator:

Clause 1. By petition setting forth that the signers thereof are in favor of recalling the specified officer or senator, and such petition shall contain the signatures of not less than 25% of the members of the ASUO eligible to vote for the specified officer or senator. Such signatures and membership in the ASUO shall be validated by the ASUO Vice President.

Clause 2. Upon validation of the signatures and membership of the signers to the petition referred to in Clause 1 of Article IX, Section I, a special election may be called by the ASUO Senate, or in the discretion of the ASUO Senate at the next regularly scheduled election the question of the recall shall be submitted to the voters. If $\frac{2}{3}$ or more of the votes cast at such election shall favor a recall, then said

officer or senator shall have been recalled.

Clause 3. Upon the recalling of an officer or senator, the ASUO Vice President shall conduct an election at the earliest most feasible time for the replacement of the recalled officer or senator in compliance with the election procedures of the ASUO.

ENABLING CLAUSES

Section I. These amendments shall be adopted by procedures of the ASUO constitution at the ASUO election of May 21, 1963.

Section II. All officers or senators presently on the ASUO senate shall complete their terms of office, according to Section II, tenure, Article VI Elections of the adopted amendment, except that the freshman class president elected in the Fall General Election shall serve on the senate until the General Spring election, 1964.

Section III. The senators added to the ASUO senate by the adoption of their amendments shall be elected according to the provisions of Section II Tenure, Article VI, of the adopted amendment beginning with the Fall, 1963, ASUO election.

Section IV. The women's off-campus senate representative shall be elected in the Fall, 1963 ASUO elections serving until the Spring 1964 ASUO election when she shall be elected as specified in Section II, Tenure, Article VI, of the adopted amendment.

term (which is also the amount of tuition raise for them).

Fee remissions above this amount may be awarded in hardship cases. Flemming pointed to this fact as valuable, for he said that this is the first time the state has offered a program of financial assistance to out-of-state students.

Flemming stated that there were no set rules on 'how needy is needy' in response to a question to that effect, and added, "I wouldn't want us to develop hard and fast rules. We will do everything we can to remove financial obstacles . . ."

In response to the question, "Do you think there will be enough out-of-state students remaining to make up the difference for the rise in tuition," Flemming said simply, "Yes."

Students now attending the University will be given priority for the fee remissions over new students, Flemming said. However, if there was still money in the fund after all the claims of present students were satisfied to the committee's satisfaction, a minimum GPA for new student applicants would be set up. Those coming from high schools would have to have a 3.00 minimum, and transfers from other colleges a 2.75.

Deadline for fee remission applications is May 27, but Flemming stressed that this did not mean that those turned in later would not be considered. "Our objective is to get the applications processed and let you know before you leave the campus," and meeting this deadline would make that objective possible, he said.
