

Orientation Week

Committee Cuts Activities

Freshmen entering the University this fall should find their first week of school a little less grueling and a little more bene-

ficial—especially if the New Student Orientation Week program formulated by the Greater Oregon Committee meets official approval later this week.

The rescheduling of rush activities to prevent their coincidence with the orientation week was approved by President Arthur Flemming earlier in the year, and Greater Oregon's proposed program has eliminated two of the four traditional all-freshmen assemblies.

The Deans' Assembly and the Registration Information Assembly were axed in the committee's new schedule of events.

In place of the Registration Information Assembly, dormitory counselors will be asked to advise the new students in their units on procedures for registration.

According to Jim Lussier, chairman of the Greater Oregon Committee, the change was suggested on the assumption that it "will give freshmen a chance to ask questions about those phases of registration which are unclear" and thereby facilitate a better understanding of the entire process.

In place of the Deans' Assembly, the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women will be introduced to the new students during the President's Convocation, one of the two required assemblies left on the program.

The Greater Oregon Assembly is the other still-scheduled meeting.

Lussier said the stress of next fall's New Student Week will be on orientation to campus life and class activities.

The committee's proposal must meet the final approval of all participating school departments and officials before becoming official.

New Student Week is scheduled for September 24-29, with classes beginning on the 30th.
