

Charter Day Ceremonies To Include Service Awards

Three Oregon citizens who have given exceptional service to the state will be honored at the University's 10th annual Charter Day ceremonies Oct. 16.

Senator Wayne L. Morse, Kenneth C. Swan, and Philip F. Brogan are the three who will receive the University's Distinguished Service Awards at the celebration of the University's founding.

The awards will be presented at the Charter Day Convocation at 10 a.m., Oct. 16 in McArthur Court. Senator Morse will be the

featured speaker.

A procession of the faculty, in academic regalia, preceeding the convocation will start the ceremonies.

They will come to a close that evening when the University, in conjunction with the Eugene-University Civic Music Association, will present a concert in McArthur Court.

The Scottish Black Watch Band with Matted Pipers and Highland Dancers will appear, starting at 8. Those to receive awards at

the morning ceremonies present an impressive list of achievements.

Senator Morse, a former dean of the University's School of Law, has been a member of the U.S. Senate since 1945.

During his association with the University, he served as an arbitrator of labor disputes, and was a member of the National War Labor Board during World War II.

Swan is head of the department of ophthalmology at the University Medical School, of which he is a graduate.

He has served as chairman of the American Board of Ophthalmology and as chairman of various consultative bodies to the National Institute of Health. He has received the national Proctor Medal Award, one of the highest in his field.

Dr. Swan has also served on the editorial boards of medical publications and has authorized several scientific papers.

He has also held lectureships in many leading universities of this country.

Newspaperman Brogan is known throughout the state for his research on Oregon's historical and geological past. His writing on these subjects has appeared widely in the press of the state.

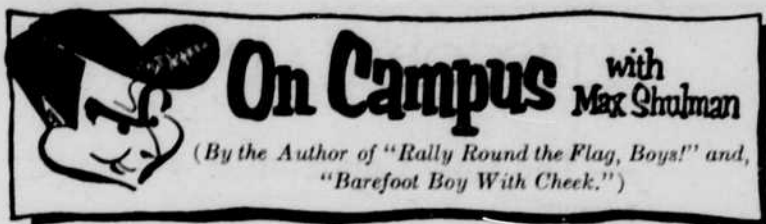
