

New Dormitory Rules Accepted

New dormitory rules have been provisionally accepted by the Faculty-Student Conduct Committee and will be formally approved Tuesday after a public meeting. New rules are as follows:

- I. Rooms must be given proper care. Occupants will be held financially responsible for damage beyond reasonable wear and tear.
- II. Sanctions may be imposed for failure to comply with the following rules, which pertain specifically to the room renting situation.
 - 1. Locked doors and fire doors must not be propped open.
 - 2. Firearms and weapons must be stored in the luggage room.
 - 3. Fire alarms and equipment must not be tampered with.

- 4. Dormitory equipment and furnishings must not be removed.
- 5. Electrical appliances must be used only in their proper places. No ironing or cooking in rooms.
- 6. Laundry facilities are restricted to residents of the building only.
- 7. Residents must stay off roofs and sides of dormitory buildings.
- 8. No pets are permitted.
- 9. House guests must be registered with counselor or head residents.
- 10. Liquor and liquor containers are not permitted in dormitory buildings.
- 11. Actions that may create a

hazard to the health or safety of residents or cause damage to property are not permitted in the dormitories; e.g., water fights, shaving cream fights, water balloon dropping, fire crackers, intentionally set fires, conspicuously unsanitary conditions, etc.

III. Sanctions may be imposed for infraction of rules pursuant to the following:

- 1. Each unit shall establish quiet hours. Decision as to what shall constitute quiet hours will be determined by either total complex, building, or unit.
- 2. Dormitory residents shall decide whether or not non-residents will be allowed to use recreational facilities.

Science Aid Decrease Evident in Congress

William V. Consolazio, senior analyst in the National Science Foundation science resources planning office, stated that the support of science so obvious after sputnik has begun to decline, and that this decline is apparent in the United States House of Representatives.

Consolazio spoke to an Honors College class in Science and Society during a visit to the University last Tuesday.

Committee Appointed

In an interview Consolazio said that a House committee appointed to investigate all government-supported research is "fundamentally a reaction to big government spending, especially in science."

He added that certain conservative elements in the House who are ignorant of the subject matter and value of this research reflect in the committee.

Request Refused

The Foundation's request for a \$267 million appropriation increase was recently turned down by a House appropriations subcommittee. Before Sputnik this was "very typical behavior on the part of the House," he explained. Consolazio continued that scientific activities which promote defense, economy, and health and welfare are still supported, but the others are not, mainly because they lack effective lobbies.

The needed lobbies exist in the institutions of higher learning, but they are not organized effectively for this kind of activity.

Songs and traditional Cossack dances set the tone for the Nov. 5 performance of the Don Cossack Chorus and Dancers in the North Eugene high school auditorium.

The show is being sponsored by the Eugene Kiwanis Club. Profits will go to various civic projects.

Film Studies Modern India

A comprehensive study of the problems of modern India is the subject of the movie "Assignment India" which will be shown at 8 p.m. tonight in the Dad's Room of the SU.

An Indian student will speak briefly and answer questions following the film. The program is sponsored by the University People to People program.

Contrasts Shown

The film contrasts old and new India, dealing with problems faced by government, progress in agriculture, education, industry, and raising the standard of living.

American students will be able to join the national People to People program at any time during the next two weeks. Yearly fees are \$2.50. One dollar of this sum will remain at the University for its program to acquaint American and international students while the remainder goes to the national organization.

Only members of the National program will be able to participate in summer travel programs to the British Isles, Middle East, Europe, and Mexico.

Activities sponsored by the University program include the "buddy" program in which an American student corresponds with an international student and helps orient him to the campus when he arrives.

Other activities include film discussion sessions and special programs involving both American and foreign students.

Program Aids Students

Phil Peek, chairman of the University program, outlined the goals of the program as "to aid in exposing the American student to the rest of the world through offering him opportunities to meet and become acquainted with the international student."

"We also aid in making the foreign student's life on this campus more enjoyable, educational, beneficial, and simplified," Peek said.
